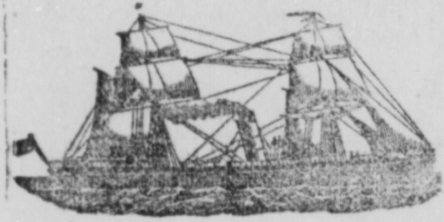

**PIONEER VS. GUARDIAN.**

The Pioneer refers to Dr. Sprague's rencontre with the Guardian concerning the liquor traffic. Dr. Sprague had said: "I believe first in prohibition." Unable to secure that, I believe, next, in the most effective restrictive legislation that can be secured. I do not believe in the unrestrained freedom of the liquor traffic under any circumstances whatever."

The Pioneer commends Dr. Sprague as "a profound thinker" and an "acute reasoner" who has few superiors, and denounces the Guardian for attempting to read him out of the temperance ranks. It says:

"The Guardian, therefore, does not try to argue the question upon which the learned doctor so boldly and unhesitatingly expresses his opinion, but endeavors to lower him in the estimation of his co-workers in the cause of temperance by attempting to read him out of the temperance ranks and to place him on a level with rum sellers."

Dr. Sprague had merely stated a belief long held by many of the more reasonable and consistent temperance men of the world, and expounded several years ago by THE EXAMINER. It was on account of its expression of this belief that THE EXAMINER was called "The Rummy Organ" and talked about and canvassed against in the temperance societies of this Province. But the Pioneer muttered no word of complaint then. Indeed, if we mistake not it joined Premier Farquharson and The Guardian and other "blood money" workers in their cry against THE EXAMINER. With such accessions to its side as Dr. Sprague, THE EXAMINER can afford to laugh at the fight now raging between The Guardian and Premier Farquharson and his organs.

**CONTROL OF EVENTS.**

NEITHER men nor nations may control all events. A proof of this fact has lately been found in the United States. The Government of the States entered upon the war with Spain for the purpose of relieving the patriots of Cuba. It was expected that Cuba would be free after the Spanish power there was crushed. But Cuba is not free yet. The Boston Herald, at least, is still doubtful about the issue of the matter, for it says:

"Cuba is still an unknown problem. There are conditions that may foment insurrection before its various elements are pacified, especially if we do not see our way clear to recognizing the independence that we proclaimed our intention of promoting."

As in Cuba so in the Philippines, the forces of the United States were welcomed as deliverers from Spanish tyranny and the promoters of independence. But the Filipinos are now fighting those whom they welcomed, and the United States government has been constrained to send additional troops and munitions of war to put the Filipinos down. It seems clear that a higher power than the Government of the United States is controlling events and defeating the good intentions of the people of the Great Republic.

—A warning to those who have soda water fountains is contained in the following news item from Pittsburgh, Pa.: "Andrew Hammer, sr., 55 years old, was this morning charging a soda fountain at his place of business, No. 134 Beaver avenue, Allegheny. The carbonic gas tank exploded. Mr. Hammer was almost blown to pieces, his body being horribly mangled. He died half an hour later. The building was considerably damaged."

**NATURAL HISTORY OUTING.**

A Pleasant Excursion to Several Historic Spots.

The annual outing of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society took place on Saturday. The excursion was participated in by about forty persons among whom were Mr. Newson, President; Mr. McSwain, Vice President; Mr. Watson, Secretary, Rev. Dr. Curran, Dr. McLeod, Judge Fitzgerald, Messrs F. Brecken, Charles Palmer, George and Frederick Gane, T. May, Silas Hodgson, W. Macready, N. Calder, W. Newson, Clark, Mesdames Fitzgerald, Gane, Macready, Watson, Hodgson, Tooker, Misses Dawson, Newson, Weeks, Johnson, Barrett, Pippy, Bartlett, McLeod. The entire party probably numbered about forty passengers, the majority of whom took passage by the E. R. to Rocky Point at 9 o'clock, the remainder of the party going by a later boat.

After calling at the Indian's camp, the party repaired to Ringwood, the site of the residence of Col. Cumberland, where an interesting historical address was delivered by Hon. F. St. C. Brecken.

The old fort and other historic spots in the vicinity were also visited, and interesting reminiscences were recalled by Mr. John Newson and Mr. Brecken.

During the course of the proceedings luncheon was provided; and late in the afternoon the party returned to Charlottetown delighted with the outing.

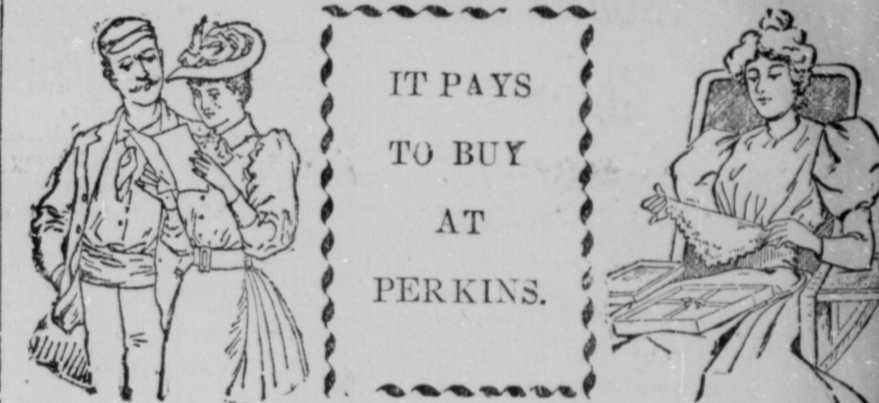
