LONDON (CP)—Married life for Nell Dunn Sandford includes a pre-occupation with dancing obols, stuffed pigs' heads and a non-playing 18th-century organ.

It is about a young girl's preparation for marriage and the couple will produce it at their flat before several playwrights.

Since she married writer-composer Jeremy Sandford last February, the fair-haired, 20-year-old granddaughter of the late Canadian millionaire Sir James Dunn has found futuristic experiments a part of her everyday life.

Between work projects the couple are searching for a permanent home. "We'd like something really old or madly modernistic." They have considered a house in the shape of a spiral—"like a snail"—but it's rather complicated to build, says Mrs. Sandford.

**SCIENTIFIC WORKROOM**  
What used to be Mrs. Sandford's tidy bedroom before her marriage has been turned into the scientific workroom. Striped quilts are strewn across the floor littered with bits of machinery, a garbage can, bicycle pumps, tape recorders, water jugs, statues, hammers and nails. The walls are hung with gilt mirrors surrounded by bright lithographs and pin-up pictures.

When they take an hour off the couple drive around in a truck and collect gadgets and antiques. Newest acquisition is an 18th-century organ which doesn't play—but Sandford hopes to fix it.
