Maritime Senior Hockey Picture Is Not Very Bright

By NICK FILLMORE Canadian Press Staff Writer HALIFAX (CP)—There's still 2 1/2 months to go, but right now chances are considered slim that the Maritime Senior Hockey League will operate this season.

Three of the four clubs in the league last year are reported unlikely to play.

The three doubtfuls are Halifax Schooners and Windsor-Dartmouth Keiths, both sponsored by Halifax brewing interests, and Moncton Hawks, sponsored by the Moncton Hockey Association.

New Glasgow Rangers, last season's Maritime champions, are the only team ready to go.

Rangers cleared \$1,000 from their 1964-65 operations while the other three teams lost a total of about \$42,000.

Hockey officials in Moncton, Windsor, N.S., and Halifax said Thursday it is doubtful other sponsors would be willing to back a team in the league this year.

But in New Glasgow league President Harry Trainor, said as far as he's concerned the loop will operate. He was still hopeful sponsors could be found in the three centres and there

was a rumor that Glace Bay, N.S., would seek entry.

"Senior leagues in the Maritimes have been in plenty of trouble before," Trainor said, "but when it comes time to go on the ice there are usually enough teams ready."

Last year New Glasgow won the league pennant with 69 points, followed by Moncton with 64, Windsor-Dartmouth with 51, and Halifax, 38.

New Glasgow disposed of Moncton in a final series that went the nine-game limit, but lost to Sherbrooke, Que., Beavers in their first Allan Cup series.

"We had a great season," said Bill MacNeil, the president of Pictou County Sport Club, the organization behind the Rangers.

He said the Rangers averaged 1,200 fans for home games and set a Pictou County Stadium attendance record in the playoffs when they packed in 3,615 for a game against Moncton.

EXPLAINS SITUATION In Halifax, Victor Oland president of Oland's and Keith's Breweries said his firm's support has been withdrawn from the Halifax and Windsor-Dartmouth entries because the league wasn't doing anything for hockey.

"The calibre of hockey was poor last year and attendance was deplorable," Oland said. "I can't see where we were doing a thing for hockey."

The 1964-65 loss of the two teams has been estimated at \$36,000.

Oland said his firm will continue to sponsor softball, basketball and other hockey teams in the Halifax area.

In Windsor, hockey promoter Earle Hood said it is doubtful a senior team will be sponsored in the Annapolis Valley town this season.

"We're still paying off Windsor Maple Leafs' debt of two years ago," Hood said.

He said attendance was less than 500 spectators a game in Windsor last season. Attendance was just as bad in Dartmouth, where the club played half its home games.

MONCTON DOUBTFUL Bob Lenahan of Moncton, a director of Moncton Hockey Association, said there is only a remote possibility a fourth team will pick up the franchise in Moncton.

"We averaged 1,000 fans last season in Moncton," Lenahan said, "but still we lost \$6,000."

"As far as I'm concerned senior hockey in the Maritimes has outlived itself. The players ask \$100 or more a week and if you don't pay it they go somewhere else. It costs \$2,000 a week to operate a team."

Lenahan said the association would concentrate on minor hockey this season and try to get either Chicago Black Hawks or Detroit Red Wings to help sponsor a junior team in Moncton in 1966-67.

"Senior hockey? ... That's dead," said Lenahan.

Low Qualifier Eliminated At Can. Golf Ch'ships

BRANTFORD, Ont. (CP)—Graham Cooke of Cooksville, Ont., Ontario junior champion, Thursday became the second upset victim of Wayne Wiseman of Ridgetown, Ont., in the Canadian junior golf championships.

Cooke, the low qualifier in the tournament with a 36-hole score of 147 and the leader of the winning Ontario team in the inter-provincial matches earlier this week, lost 2 and 1 in the third-round match and failed to make today's quarter-finals.

The two golfers were even going to the 16th hole where Cooke hit two shots out of bounds and finally conceded. He missed a three-foot putt on the 17th to give the match to Wiseman.

Wiseman won his first-round match 1 up Wednesday over the Alberta team's top golfer, John Souter of Calgary.

SHORT STREAKS

Jim Short of Toronto, another member of the Ontario team, continued to be the hottest golfer in the competition. He chipped from 45 feet for an eagle to win the first hole, captured the next four holes and coasted to a 5 and 4 victory over Peter Knechtel of Kitchener, Ont.

Peter Turner of Toronto also advanced to the quarter-finals, defeating his club-mate at Toronto Summit, Jim Dysart, 3 and 2.

All three New Brunswick golfers in the third round were ousted. The province's top golfer in the team competition, Pierre Rossignol, lost to Doran Doucet of Windsor Mills, Que., 4 and 3.

New Brunswick's junior champion, Grant Forbes of Edmund-

ston, was eliminated 5 and 4 by Toronto's Gordon Stollery. Robert MacFarlane, also of Edmonton, was beaten 5 and 4 by Al Greenstreet of Vancouver.

Alberta's two remaining competitors also were eliminated. Mike Sturko of Edmonton fell 2 and 1 to Terry More of Winnipeg, and Ian Thomas of London, Ont., won the 12th, 15th and 17th holes to defeat John Rule of Calgary, 3 and 1.

SCORED UPSET In Thursday morning's second-round action, MacFarlane scored a major upset by ousting 1964 Ontario junior champion Wayne McDonald of Milton, one of the low qualifiers.

Rossignol, one of the low qualifiers, put out the only remaining Saskatchewan entry, Murray Osborn of Saskatoon, by scoring a 2-up victory.

The eight remaining golfers enter the quarter-finals this morning, with the semi-finals in the afternoon and the 36-hole final Saturday.

Casey Stengel Bids Farewell

NEW YORK (AP)—Casey Stengel said goodbye to his players Thursday in what was probably the shortest speech the garrulous old baseball man ever made.

Stengel announced his retirement as manager of New York Mets Monday, and although he remains in the post technically until the end of the season, he made his farewell to Shea Stadium Thursday.

"Now, mainly to the fellows who have been here all the way through — anybody who played here four years, you weathered the storm. Whether good or bad, you survived," the 75-year-old Stengel said in his clubhouse speech lasting only a couple of minutes.

He exhorted the last-place Mets to do a "fine finish" in the final month of the National League season and said, "your improvement has been terrific. If you could see yourselves on television you'd see how improved you are."

Stengel has seen the team only on television since he fractured his left hip July 25. The injury brought about his retirement, after an active career in baseball that dates back to 1916.

Before the clubhouse talks, the Mets retired Stengel's No. 37 in a ceremony at the pitcher's mound.

SHORT SPEECH "This is gonna be the shortest speech I have ever made," he promised, as he stood in the centre of the clubhouse, supported by his crooked, black cane. He was surrounded by eager but silent players.
