

# Torpid Is The Winner Of Annual Little Brown Jug

DELAWARE, Ohio (AP)—Torpid won the 12th annual \$73,328 Little Brown Jug for three-year-old pacers Thursday by taking the rain-delayed third heat at the Delaware County fairgrounds.

The bay son of Knight Dream took the two-division classic in straight heats, winning the first in 2:00.4 and the third in 2:03.2. Meadow Lands, driven by Del Miller, won the second division heat in 2:01 with the five leaders in each division coming back for the payoff jaunt.

Adios Express, driven by Joe O'Brien, of Alberton, P.E.I., finished fifth in the first heat and second in the second heat to grab fourth place in the over-all picture.

Johnny Simpson, driver of Torpid, became the first ever to win with the classic in successive years and the second ever to capture the Hambletonian Trot and the Jug the same season. He won the 1956 pace with Noble Adios and this year's Hambletonian with Hickory Smoke.

Thursday's victory added \$27,205.41 to Torpid's two-year earnings which now have reached \$182,793.41. In 39 heats, the colt has won 36 times, losing three to Adios Express.

After Torpid had taken the first heat and Meadow Lands the second, the runoff was delayed more than two hours because of a heavy rain. The surface of the track was scraped away and sand placed over the half-mile oval.

Torpid had to come from behind in both heats. He was away third in the opener behind Morris Eden and Great Adios, but took the lead at the half from Robert Lee Frost. A driving finish in the stretch gave him the win over Morris Eden by a length.

In the second division, Meadow Lands fought his way to the outside at the head of the stretch and nipped Newport Judy, one of the two fillies in the field of 16, by 1½ lengths. Maxine's Dream, the other filly, was third in the heat.

In the deciding heat, Torpid

was away third behind Morris Eden and Newport Judy, the latter taking the lead at the quarter in 29 4-5 seconds.

Great Adios led at the half in 1:01 and at the three-quarters in 1:32.4. Torpid, pacing fifth, swung wide just after the three-quarter pole and in a driving finish took it all by two lengths over Adios Express.

Maxine's Dream was third, Morris Eden fourth and Meadow Lands fifth.

## Winnipeg Sues Leafs & Habs

WINNIPEG (CP)—The Winnipeg hockey club has filed suit for \$125,000 against Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League for \$125,000 damages.

The Western Hockey Club, which operates Winnipeg, says it did not make any aggregate net profit or any profits during the first two years of the agreement and the defendants eastern clubs failed to furnish enough players of Western paid. It says it asked for repayment of \$125,000 but was refused.

The suit says the Winnipeg club made an agreement in 1955 with Toronto and Montreal for a period of at least two years, under which the NHL clubs would keep on continuous loan to Winnipeg 15 players of Western calibre or better.

The Winnipeg club says that in 1955 and 1956 it suffered a loss of \$58,890 on operations and a 22½ per cent loss of profit estimated at \$50,000.

The Winnipeg club says that under the agreement it was to pay Montreal and Toronto 50 per cent of aggregate net profits during the first two years of the agreement and the defendants eastern clubs failed to furnish enough players of Western paid. It says it asked for repayment of \$125,000 but was refused.

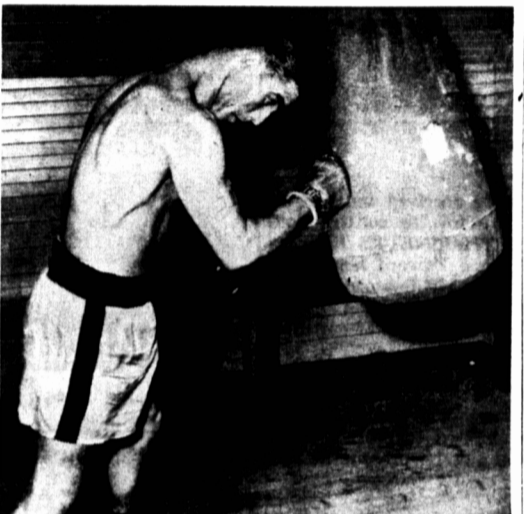
Simpson said he was going to concede the point anyway but couldn't run the ball out as Hamilton fans, mostly children, had crowded the touchline.

Tonight at Civic Stadium, Bud Ramsay, one of Prince Edward Island's greatest fighters, goes into a fight that headlines the card for the first time in his tempestuous career. Ramsay knows the hard knocks of the fight game as well as anyone. He has been overmatched on occasion but gamely waded into his opponent until the lights went out. He has had his share of knockouts, and it is doubtful if anyone remembers Bud's being in a really dull contest. With Ramsay in there you can be sure of blood, sweat and cheers, because Ramsay is that sort of fighter. In Norman "Kid" Walsh, he will have a worthy opponent and both boys will be giving

their all to annex the P.E.I. - N.B. welterweight crown. It is hoped a large crowd will turn out to see Bud Ramsay come into his own at last as a headliner on a fight card.

## White Sox Beat Senators 7-3

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chicago White Sox tore loose for four runs in the 13th inning Thursday and finally overcame Washington Senators, 7-3, to keep their hopes burning faintly in the American League pennant race.

Nellie Fox and Minnie Minoso slammed consecutive homers to account for three runs in the last inning of the marathon struggle with the seventh-place Senators.

With the other clubs idle, the second-ranked Chicago crept up a half-game on the New York Yankees but still remained six games behind the leaders.

And the magic number in the waning days of the season stayed at four. Any combination of four Yankee wins and White Sox defeats will clinch the pennant for the New Yorkers.

The White Sox employed 20 players, including six pitchers, to out-last the Senators in a game played in near silence before 957 paying customers. The paid attendance was smallest of the year in either league.

Fox's sixth homer of 1957 just cleared the right field fence inside the foul pole. It also scored Luis Aparicio, who had opened the 13th with a single off loser Pedro Ramos.

Minso then hit his 11th four-bagger, a shot that flew into the Sox left field bullpen. Ted Beard later singled home Jim Lmardo, who had doubled, for the seventh Chicago run.

Bob Keegan, last of the Chicago hurlers, worked only two innings but received credit for his 16th victory against eight setbacks.

The Sox now need only one Milwaukee at Chicago — Spahn 19-10 vs. Rush 6-15; St. Louis at Cincinnati — Mizell 8-10 vs. Gross (69)

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## FIGHTS IN MAIN EVENT

Fight night at Summerside Civic Stadium this evening gives Summerside's battling Bud Ramsay his first big break as a main-eventer in a P.E.I. - N.B. Welterweight Championship bout against Kid Walsh of MacAdam, N.B.

## Moore And Anthony Fight For Lighthweight Title

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Archie Moore the distinguished antique of the ring from California, puts his world light heavyweight championship on the line for the sixth time tonight and it might just happen that boyish Tony Anthony of New York will take it.

The two go into the ring at the Olympic Auditorium for 15 rounds or less in a fight that will be televised across the United States but with Los Angeles blocked out for a radius of 150 miles. The time: 7 p.m. PDT 11 p.m. ADT.

In one corner will be San Diego's timeless Archie, a remarkable man of more than 40, engaging in his 186th professional match and at the age when even the bravest of bar-room battlers have sensed the value of physical self-restraint.

In the other corner will be Anthony, who has had but 35 pro fights and who was not quite two years old when Archie Moore stepped into the ring for the first time.

The two will probably answer the bell at about even money.

with Moore possibly a slight favorite when the onlookers discover he can move about very well without cane or crutch.

Moore has won 138 bouts, 116 by knockout. He lost 22 and drew in five. Anthony had won 30, been stopped four times and held to one draw, by Yvon Durelle of Baie St. Anne, N.B. He has 23 knockouts to his credit.

Moore won the light heavyweight championship in St. Louis Dec. 17, 1952, in 15 rounds from Jley Maxim; managed by J. Kearns. He defended it successfully in 1953 in Odgin, Utah, against Maxim; in 1954 in Miami against Maxim; against Harold Johnson in New York in 1952; against Yolande Pompey in London in 1956.

It is also recorded that Archie in two bids for the heavyweight title was knocked stiff by Rocky Marciano in 1955 and by Floyd Patterson last November.

Archie and Anthony both say they want Patterson, eventually. Neither has expressed a wish that Marciano come out of retirement.
