**P. E. I. Junior Drama Festival Adjudicator is Announced**

Reverend Preston Hamill, co-ordinator of Junior Drama for the Prince Edward Island Drama Festival Association, announced recently the appointment of Mrs. Elizabeth Willet as adjudicator for Junior drama in this year's Prince Edward Island Drama Festival.

Mrs. Willet in the past has been active in the Theatre, the Eastern Montreal Players and the Georgetown Players and received a Prince Edward Island Drama Festival Scholarship in 1951 and studied drama under Donald Wetmore at the Nova Scotia Summer School of Fine Arts in Halifax. She has written numerous one-act and three-act plays, and has directed two original Christmas productions "Jouyou Noel" last year, and "Christmas Meditation" this year.

There are four classes in Junior drama: 1. High School; 2. Schools of Cities and towns; 3. All other Island Schools; 4. Special group open to any Island School for Grades 1-5.

Mrs. Willet, as adjudicator, will be taking part in the festival at any time of the year which the school decides to present. The festival is a drama competition. The best play from each class will be presented before the time of the Prince Edward Island Drama Festival and will be presented as part of the Festival. **U. N. Session Ends Without Agreement On Disarmament**

**UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)** — The 12th General Assembly of the United Nations has wound up with lack of agreement on disarmament and on the "coexistence of peace."

This was the term used by Sir Lewis to any school, but the president of the assembly, in his closing speech Saturday night. He said the delegates agreed on disarmament "must be judged as falling far short of what the world expects from their organization."

"I believe it more than ever essential that we should grapple with this menace of great armaments."

"I believe that we should seek, resolutely and without delay, to break the nuclear stalemate, to end this coexistence of fear. It must be our constant endeavor to widen the margin between safety and deadly peril."

During the 12 months session the assembly voted, over objection of the Soviet bloc, for a new UN disarmament commission. This body, extended from 12 to 15 members, will meet in January, but Russia and its satellite have threatened to boycott the commission.

**HOPE THREAT TO FADE**  
Key members of the Canadian delegation who took an active part in working for a disarmament compromise acceptable to the Russians, still express hope that either the boycott will not materialize or that some other solution will be found to keep negotiations alive.

But as the delegates concluded the assembly which opened Sept. 17, there was no immediate prospect of any progress on the subject at the NATO conference in Paris this week.

**Oil Sausage Is Demonstrated**

**HAMBURG** West Germany (Reuters) — An "oil sausage" — a sausage-shaped plastic bag which can be filled with oil and towed by ships — was demonstrated here today.

The model in the demonstration was 100 feet long but the full-size container will be more than 600 feet long and will hold 20 tons of oil.

Inventor Ernst Droppguth says it has three main advantages over oil tankers: it is easy to handle, it is stable in storms and its cost is one-seventh to one-tenth of that of a tanker.
