

Macs Defeat Wembley 4-2

LONDON (CP)—Canada's world hockey champions, on the last lap of their European tour, defeated Wembley Lions 4-2 Saturday night.

The British National Hockey League club never had a chance against Belleville after the visitors took the lead with two quick goals in the opening minutes of the game.

Leftwinger George Gosselin fired two of the Belleville markers with Bart Bradley and Minnie Menard getting the others; The Wembley marksmen were Mike Daski and Les Aming.

The Lions, almost all Canadians, hold down second place in the four-team British league. The pace-setting Paisley Pirates played Belleville to a 3-3 draw last month in the Canadian's first game on European soil.

Although the Canadians took nine of the game's 12 penalties, they were warmly received by the crowd, which included a substantial section of London's Canadian colony.

But the visitors were resoundingly booed in the third period when centre Johnny McLellan, objecting to a high-sticking penalty, pushed one of the referees who fell to the ice. McLellan received a match misconduct sentence.

Belleville's more publicized badman, Al Dewsbury, who served more penalty time than any other player in the world hockey tournament that ended in Prague last week, was one of the more popular Canadians, even though he was sent off twice.

The crowd cheered when a Wembley player was penalized for hooking the Canadian defence-man.

A few minutes later, Dewsbury was applauded warmly when his rink-length stickhandling effort just failed to produce a goal.

The Canadians, who have only two games left before they return home, flashed a brief burst of speed in the opening stages and appeared to coast the rest of the way.

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Summerside Aces defeated Sackville combines 5-3 in overtime here Saturday night to take the best-of-five final for the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Intermediate "A" hockey championship in straight games.

Gaudet put Summerside ahead 2-1 in the second. Then the teams exchanged penalty shots before Gotherau scored late in the third to send the game into overtime.

Leafs Cop Playoff Berth; Rangers Lose Out To Habs

DETROIT (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night nailed down a Stanley Cup playoff berth by a one-point margin, defeating Detroit Red Wings 6-4 in the final game of the National Hockey League season.

Toronto had to overcome 2-0 and 3-2 deficits to defeat the last-place Wings and edge ahead of New York Rangers for the fourth and last playoff spot.

The Rangers Sunday night lost their chance of ousting Toronto when they lost 4-2 to Montreal Canadiens at New York.

HIGH THIS YEAR The Leafs won their last five games of the season in a spurt that carried them to their highest standing during the entire campaign. They were last most of the way until bumping Detroit into the cellar a month ago.

Toronto will open its semi-final series in Boston Tuesday night. The Leafs had a chartered plane comeback and earn the fourth and final playoff berth.

Dickie Moore, Montreal's great left winger, scored a goal and an assist to set a season scoring record of 96 points as he helped blast the Rangers out of the playoff spot they had so confidently expected to win.

But during the last couple of weeks Rangers could do nothing right.

Wilson Is New NHL Iron Man

DETROIT (AP)—The National Hockey League has a new iron man.

Johnny Wilson, a 29-year-old Detroit Red Wing, took over the title Saturday when he played in his 509th consecutive NHL game. New York Rangers won the game 5-2.

Wilson broke the previous record of 508 set by Murray Murdoch upon his retirement from the Rangers in 1937. Murdoch

now is hockey coach at Yale University.

Wilson, a soft-spoken young man who was honored at a between-periods ceremony with a trophy in recognition of his feat, wasn't impressed by his record, achieved on a consecutive string stretching back 7 1-3 seasons to Jan. 10, 1952, when he came out of the minors to join the Red Wings.

CALL IT FREAK RECORD "Let's face it," he said, "this is one of those freak records," just before he skated out at 1:47 of the televised game.

"This is something like getting a gold star for perfect attendance," he continued.

Actually, the brush-cut Wilson, who weighs only 168 pounds but throws them around recklessly at times, hasn't missed a game in 10 seasons of pro hockey, counting minor league time with Omaha and Indianapolis. Nor has he failed to appear in a playoff game, so his consecutive game record as a pro stretches back 760 games.
