What better time than on the afternoon of Mother's Day to put on a show for Grandma Mommy and Daddy, of course, bring the children. Daddy could be the M. C., "Mommy" his assistant in staging the show. Refreshments should be brought by the visitors. Simple foods to be served in Grandma's own special dishes, with coffee and tea in pots from her own wedding-silver service. Candies, salted nuts and old-time cookies should be ready to pass.

Oh, almost forgot! The ice cream! We'll save that for last. Measurements are level. IRISH OAT COOKIES. 1/2 c. shortening, soft 2/3 c. sugar 2 eggs (unbeaten) 2 eggs (unbeaten) 1 tsp vanilla 1/2 tsp salt 1/2 tsp baking soda 1 c. uncooked rolled oats (quick or old-fashioned). Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Mix shortening and sugar together until creamy. Mix in eggs and vanilla. Sift together flour, salt and baking soda. Mix into cream-dough mixture thoroughly. Stir-mix in oats. Roll out on lightly floured smooth surface to 1/4" thickness. Cut with 2" round cutter first dipped in flour. Place cookies

11" apart on oiled cookie sheets. (Dust with granulated sugar if desired.) Bake 12 to 15 min. in pre-heated oven (375 degrees F.) Makes 4 doz.

Tomorrow Is The Day Set To Honor Mothers

Light shadow and sunshine—a thin ribbon of gray cloud across the face of the sun, and then—the magic of a pretty spring blue sky: such was this day which now with the week moves away. And there, once more were those fleecy white clouds dipping down to Mr. C.'s hayland, which climbs to a hill-top, begging us to step on board. Whither should we travel and when should we go? Not far truly and surely not this busy day on the farm. Home to see Mother, the thought came longingly, as so many will be going presently for a fond visit. We however can make that trip now, which ever brought us a welcoming smile, only in memory. Mothers! By and large, they are a remarkable sisterhood. By rights they pay no favorites in the family. They are justifiably proud of the fine children, yet maintain a warm spot in their hearts for the wayward one: loving him tenderly, praying for him to the last ditch of his way and beyond—past everything; remembering that he was once a dear lad, kind and good like the rest.

Warmest tributes, the world's great men and women have paid their mothers. Among these "I had a good mother," the Salvation Army Founder, William Booth, once wrote. "So good it has ever appeared to me that all I know of her life seemed a striking contradiction of the doctrine of human depravity. In my youth, I fully accepted that doctrine, and I do not deny it now; but my patient, self-sacrificing mother always appeared to be an exception to the rule. I loved my mother. From infancy to manhood, I lived in her. Home was not home to me without her. I do not remember any single act of willful disobedience to her wishes. When my father died, I was so passionately attached to my mother that I can recollect that deeply though I felt his loss, my grief was all but forgotten by the thought that it was not my mother who had been taken from me." And yet one of the regrets that has followed me to the present hour is that I did not with sufficient tenderness and assiduity at the time, attempt the impossible task of repaying the immeasurable debt I owed to that mother's love.
