LIQUOR LICENSES IN ST. JOHN.—Up to 3 o'clock on Friday, says the Sun, twenty-four licenses, out of the forty-five granted, had been taken out, and the coffers of the city had been enriched to the extent of \$3,600 thereby.

AFTER HORSES.—Two American gentlemen have been in the city for the last week buying horses to send across the border. They have succeeded in securing ten, and will leave for P. E. I. on Tuesday to purchase a lot more animals.—Halifax Herald.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—An elderly woman named McKenzie, belonging to West River was seriously injured about the head and face this afternoon by falling over one of the projecting hinges in the hatchway at the corner of Queen and Water Street.

THE PUBLIC LIBRARY.—His Honor the Stipendiary Magistrate occupied the chair at the meeting last evening. The matter of the establishment of a library was discussed, and it was resolved to take action under the act of incorporation passed last session, at a meeting to be held in the City Council Chamber on Monday evening next.

SENTENCE DEFERRED.—Wm. Peeper, convicted at Halifax for the murder of Peter Doyle last fall, will not be sentenced till the next term of the supreme court of Nova Scotia, which meets in October. Sentence was deferred because of legal objections against the trial having been raised by Peeper's counsel.

NELLIE TAYLOR'S CASE.—Sheriff McQueen has received a communication from the Minister of Justice, stating that Nellie Taylor's unexpired sentence in the Dorchester jail was remitted and the sentence of 7 years to the penitentiary, given her by Judge Botsford, at the last sitting of the County Court, was to commence at once.

MAIL MATTERS.—The mails will arrive at the usual hour this evening. English correspondence posted before 9.30 this evening will be in time for the mail steamer which leaves Rimouski on Thursday, next.

The registration fee on matter for the United States has been increased to five cents.

SCHOOL BOARD.—A meeting of the School Board was held last evening. A. Kennedy, Esq., presiding. The most important part of the business transacted was the change made in the grading of the city schools. Hitherto the work was done by a Grading Master appointed and paid by the Board. In future the grading is to be done by the Principals of the Schools, assisted by the Secretary.

THE STEAMERS.—The Princess of Wales arrived from Pictou about seven o'clock last evening. Captain Cameron reports meeting a good deal of drift ice in the Gulf. The steamer St. Lawrence sailed for Pictou about noon to-day. She will return during the night or early to-morrow morning. The steamer Carroll from Boston via Halifax, is expected to-morrow.

The M. A. Starr left Halifax for Charlottetown, via eastern ports this morning. The Northern Light arrived here at half-past eleven this forenoon. She will go upon the slip in a day or two. The St. Lawrence leaves here for Shediac to-morrow morning. The Princess of Wales left Pictou for this port at 1.45 this afternoon.

DANGERS OF THE SEA.—Mr. H. F. Coombs has published a brochure entitled "A Narrative of the Dangers of the Sea" for the purpose of directing the attention of the public and particularly of legislators to the pressing need for a stringent law and regulations under which unseaworthy, rotten vessels can be detained, and the owners of seaworthy ships being compelled to provide their vessels with a sufficient number of good, strong, sound boats, always ready provisioned and fitted up with life-saving appliances so as to afford the largest possible safety. The subject is one which should engage the attention of legislators and all; for all are interested in the saving of human life.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

OTTAWA, May 7.

In the House to-day, Hon. Mr. Thompson introduced a bill providing that elections in the Northwest be held the same day as in the other Provinces. In answer to Mr. Davies, Sir Charles Tupper said the total amount advanced by the Government to the Harbor Commission in Quebec amounted to three and a quarter million dollars.

In answer to Dr. Cameron, Sir H. Langevin said the Government could not state positively what they would do in reference to a subsidy to the Inverness & Richmond Railway; but so far the promoters of the enterprise had failed to show the Government their ability to carry it out to successful completion. The balance of the afternoon was spent in discussing private orders.

The militia estimates make provision for the purpose of new ordnance for the Sydney Battery to the amount of \$3,000. Puckney Green, of New York, and Col. Snow and W. B. Ross of Halifax are here respecting Short Line Matters.

Norvin Green and Erastus Wiman are expected in Ottawa.

Among the private bills passed through Committee of the Whole were McCarthy and Jameson's bills amending the Scott Act.

Insurance.

MONTREAL, May 7.

An American insurance expert now in the city returns to New York with a large number of risks. Many of the clients of companies now doing business in the city have, in consequence of the increase in rates, refused to renew their risks and are seeking insurance across the line. One of the largest fire brokers in the city stated this morning that the situation was serious, and that the business of his and other companies was being largely interfered with in consequence of the removal of their insurance. The companies had all along been opposed to increasing their rates but were forced to do so for their own protection, and to compel the city to improve its fire brigade.

Collision of Steamers.

NORFOLK, Va., May 7.

The British steamer Benson, from Matanzas for Philadelphia, was in collision yesterday about noon, during a dense fog, with the steamer Eureka, 108 miles southeast of Cape Henlopen. When the fog lifted, an hour afterward, the Eureka was nowhere to be seen. It is feared that she sank after the collision. There was a sound of escaping steam and one whistle. The Benson's bow was badly stove in. She would have sunk but for her watertight compartment. The Eureka was a freight boat. The officers and crew numbered 33.

No Communication.

LONDON, May 8.

Sir James Ferguson, Under Foreign Secretary stated in the Commons to-day that no official communication had passed between the Government and the Pope in reference to the letters rescript condemning boycotting and the plan of campaign in Ireland. He also stated that the Government has not brought to bear any influence to bring about the issue of rescript.

Lansdowne and Canadian Art.

TORONTO, May 7.

Lord and Lady Lansdowne were tendered a public reception this evening in the Pavilion Music Hall. Mayor Carke read a civic address of farewell to which His Excellency replied at some length. To-night His Excellency formally opened the annual exhibition of the Royal Canadian Academy of Artists.

The Irish Question.

ROME, May 7.

In view of the attitude of leaders of the National League, the Pope has instructed Cardinal Simeoni to dictate Mgr. Persico to obtain from the Irish Bishops, without delay, a declaration of their views upon the rescript. The observations of the Bishops will be submitted to a congregation of the Propaganda.

A Grit Elected.

OTTAWA, May 7.

Edwards (Grit) was elected in Russell by a majority of over 200. The French district of Clarence, in which Edwards lives and does business, gave him 500 majority, 50 more than at the general election. In the other districts of the county the vote stood about the same as at the general election.

Ah Sin Successful.

MONTREAL, May 7.

It is understood that Man Kow, the Chinaman whose wares were seized for undervaluation, has been successful in getting a portion of them at least revalued. The errors were caused by translation of the Chinese invoices.

The Treaty.

WASHINGTON, May 7.

Senator Edmunds has reported the fisheries treaty adversely. Senator Morgan submitted a favorable minority report. Edmunds gave notice that he would call up the treaty a week hence.
