## Fifth Confederation Bonsel Opens Today At Local Curling Club

The Fifth Confederation Bonsel, highlight event of the local curling season, gets underway today at the Charlottetown Club. As the close of the week-long play some eight trophies, plus individual and special prizes will have been awarded in the competitions. Run in three sections, the first section has already a capacity entry of 20 rinks. The second section permits 22 and the third 24. In the first section will be a total of seven trophies, the Maritime Central Always Championship trophy, the Imperial Oil Reserve Championship, the Wholesale Grocers, British American Oil and Morrison and MacRae Ltd. trophies in the qualifying elimination, and the Prowse Bros. Ltd., in the Intermediate elimination. The Roadmakers Shield in this event will be awarded on a points basis.

In the second section commencing Thursday the rinks will be battling for the R. T. Hokman Ltd. trophy. This will be played on a knockout basis. There will be a minor section with special prizes awarded on a points basis. Saturday will see an innovation—a mixed curling competition. This promises to be of particular interest and already the committee reports a large number of entries. On the final day too, there will be a "points" competition with individual prizes.

Registration will take place this morning at the club house at 10 a. m. Members of competing rinks

are requested to have a representative attend for the draw at 10.30. Eight rinks will open play at one o'clock.

Competing rinks are arriving from Moncton (Beaver) Club, Saint John (Thistle), Newcastle, Halifax and St. Stephen. It is expected that Summerside, Montague and Alberton will be all represented.

The program calls for a bonsel banquet Wednesday evening and a dance at the club on Friday night.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18 — (AP) — Boston Bruins moved into a third-place tie with New York in the National Hockey League tonight by scoring a 7-3 victory over the hapless Chicago Black Hawks before a crowd of 8,064. It was Chicago's 25th defeat against four ties and only one triumph in its last 30 starts.

After a 1-1 first period, the Bruins' furious offensive scored four goals in the second and two in the third.

## TORONTO 5, NEW YORK 2

NEW YORK, Feb. 18 — (AP) — Overcoming a two-goal deficit, Toronto Maple Leafs defeated New York Rangers 5-2 in a bruising tussle before 13,453 National Hockey League fans tonight.

Trailing 2-0 going into the second, Toronto evaded the count in that session on goals by Max Bentley and Bill Barilko. Bentley's goal, on a shot from far out, came while New York defenseman Jack Evans was in the penalty box and goalie Chuck Rayner was without his stick.

Cal Gardner put the Leafs ahead at 5:57 of the third period and Sid Smith notched the insurance tally a few minutes later. Gardner netted the last goal of the game with 29 seconds left.

Reggie Sinclair and Nick Mickoski were the goal-getters for New York in the rough-house first period. A total of 14 penalties were dealt out in the first stanza, eight of them against the Leafs.

The first-period fireworks started when defenseman Gus Morton butt-ended Tony Leswick in front of the Toronto nets, Art Evans, New York rearguard, slugged it out with Morton and they whaled each other for minutes. Morton got two majors and a misconduct and Evans a minor and a major.

## TORONTO 2, NEW YORK 0

TORONTO, Feb. 18 — (CP) — With rookie goalie Al Rollins getting his fourth shutout of the season and veteran Howie Meeker scoring the goals, Toronto Maple Leafs chalked up a 2-0 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers Saturday night before 13,548 fans.

Meeker, plagued with injuries most of this season, had scored only one goal before breaking out with his pair against Rangers. Both came on plays set up by centre Cal Gardner and Rookie Danny Lewicki had a hand in one.

Rollins blocked 25 New York shots in achieving his perfect game. It was his 77th full game this season and he has allowed only 51 goals, the hottest goals-against average in the league.

Goalie Chuck Rayner of Rangers, handling 30 Toronto shots, shared starring honors with Rollins and Meeker. He stirred the Toronto crowd to cheers with one save off Sid Smith while playing without a stick and in the last minute he foiled a penalty shot by Tod Sloan, Toronto's top goal getter.

Referee Bill Chadwick called the penalty shot first in Toronto this season, with 34 seconds to go. It was against defenseman Allan Stanley who pulled Toronto's Harry Watson down on a breakaway play.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 18 — (CP) — Coach Les Ramsay, with three goals, paced Saint John Beavers to a 6-4 win over Charlottetown Islanders in a Maritime Major Hockey League fixture Saturday night.

Paul Platz and Buck Whitlock scored into an empty Charlottetown net on two of the three occasions when Islanders tried to come from behind in the third by taking out sub-goalie Frank Strain. Nick Nicole was the other Saint John scorer. The Charlottetown goals were shot by Johnny Horeck, Matt Beaton, Walter Pawlyshyn and Frank Bathgate.

The Islanders' loss, and win by Halifax St. Mary's over Moncton Hawks, cut Charlottetown's lead over Halifax to 13 points. Third place Beavers are 12 below Halifax and 27 ahead of Hawks.

The short-handed Saint John team dressed only 10 men, including Ramsay who played his first home game for Beavers and gave a strong performance with Platz and Roger Jodoin. It was the end of a hard-luck road trip for the 12 Islanders, swamped 8-2 at Moncton Friday night.
