Zinc Fungicides Tested At Experimental Station

"Great interest has been shown by potato growers in a recent press release about the possibility of using zinc sulphate and other zinc salts to increase potato yields," says the current issue of Farm News, issued at Ottawa by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. "Perhaps more was read into the release than was intended, for the work on which it was based is still experimental. It is not recommended at present that growers use zinc sulphate as a seed treatment, or as a supplementary fertilizer, or as a soil treatment, or as a spray mixture."

"In reporting more fully on the work being done at the Charlottetown Experimental Station, Assistant Plant Pathologist, L. C. Callbeck, says that the studies developed as an interesting off-shoot in testing new potato fungicides. It had been observed, for example, that one organic fungicide, excellent for controlling fungus diseases on certain vegetables, seriously depressed the yield of potatoes. On the other hand it is frequently reported that zinc-containing fungicides encourage increases in potato yields and observations indicated that there may be some justification for these claims.

"The increase—if it is assumed that there is an increase, may be induced from one of the following: (a) zinc-containing fungicides are less phytotoxic (less poisonous to plants); (b) the zinc in the fungicide stimulates growth or satisfies a minor element deficiency; (c) a combination of both factors.

"At present zinc is the only metal other than copper that has found its way into Prince Edward Island's commercial plantings, reaching them chiefly in the form of zinc sulphate. For this reason the element zinc has been given priority in this new phase of fungicide research.

"Tests have been conducted for two years and although small increases in yields have resulted from treating the seed pieces in zinc sulphate solutions, from incorporating zinc sulphate in the soil, and from including zinc sulphate in the copper spray mixture, no real conclusions may be drawn from the results of these experiments. The tests were conducted in the Laboratory plot area near Charlottetown and it is conceivable that the results might be quite different if the tests were carried out on other soils. Tests in other areas have been set out this season.

"In conclusion, Mr. Callbeck emphasizes that these studies are still in the early stage of experimentation; that considerable research will have to be done before definite conclusions can be reached; and that it is not recommended that potato growers use zinc sulphate as a seed treatment, or as a supplementary fertilizer. Rather, he suggests they should 'wait and see'."

Pump House Break Reported By M.E.C.

Employees of the Maritime Electric Company in checking over various pieces of machinery in operation outside the main plant during Friday night, discovered the pump house door forced and on investigation found that certain vital machinery had been tampered with.

The pumps, which are responsible for the circulation of 10,000 gallons of water per minute, could have been put out of commission by the slightest interference on the part of anyone not familiar with the operating. Fortunately this was not done.

The machinery tampered with included a crane which was put in operation but did not do any damage.

Plant houses have been broken into at least five times this summer and Superintendent Ainsworth is fearful of the damage which may result, should the course of the offenders continue.

See Reversal In Gov't Policy On TV Expansion

MONTREAL, Sept. 7 (CP) — Television, the wonder child of 20th century electronics, came to Canada Saturday night as the CBC officially opened CBT, this country's first TV station.

The national radio service thus launched what promises eventually to be a network of state-operated television stations stretching from coast to coast. The second link in that network — station CBLT Toronto — goes on the air officially tomorrow night.

As the new service moved under way, Revenue Minister McCann told its viewers in an opening night message that they can ride free for the remainder of this fiscal year — up to March 31 next — without paying a special television licence fee.

But he warned that the government expects those who benefit from the new entertainment medium to foot the bill for its operation. He did not indicate how much the TV licence fee will cost, but it has been freely reported it will be \$15 a year.

He repeated Prime Minister St. Laurent's recent announcement that the government will arrange a further loan for the CBC to enable it to make an early start on the second stage of its TV service — establishment of stations at Vancouver, Winnipeg and Halifax.

Then, significantly, he added that Mr. St. Laurent especially had asked him to say that the government is "making provision for the expansion of television service by private interests."

Observers here took that statement as an indication of a possible reversal of the government's previously-announced policy that no private station licences would be granted until a coast-to-coast CBC service had been established. Dr. McCann is the cabinet minister through which the CBC reports to parliament.
