ed a potent economic force in the equitable and efficient distribution of milk throughout England and Wales. As a matter of fact, months before the war broke out, the Milk Board, in collaboration with the Government, had prepared plans for the regulation and control of all milk supplies in the event of war. When the war did break out, the milk policy was taken over by the Ministry of Food and from that time until the present all allocation of supplies and their distribution have been made through the Board's organization acting on behalf of the Ministry.

Kill Motion For More Aid

HALIFAX, March 14—(CP)—A motion asking the Federal Government to assume more financial responsibility for poultry killed because of an outbreak of Newcastle Disease was defeated in the Nova Scotia Legislature today after Agriculture Minister Mackenzie outlined action already being taken.
The motion, from G. I. Smith (PC-Colchester), was lost 22-10 with the eight opposition and two C.C.F. members voting in favor. All Liberals present voted against.

66th Anniversary Of Local Salvation Army Corps Being Celebrated

The Charlottetown Citadel Corps of the Salvation Army will welcome to its heart again former leaders in the persons of Major and Mrs. Victor McLean. Stationed here in 46-48 they gave a splendid account of their war-fare in Christ and made many friends for the Salvation Army. Major and Mrs. McLean will conduct the 66th anniversary services for the local corps of the Army tomorrow.
The work on Prince Edward Island was in actuality begun in Summerside the same winter of 1886, just two months previous to the opening of the work on March 16th, 1886, in Charlottetown. The late Colonel L. DesBrisay of Charlottetown, rose to a high rank and position in the Army, tells the story in her memoirs of how these strange semi-militant religious fire-brands came to the city in the persons of a few people and stirred the whole island with their holy abandonment, so much so that her father, (she at that time being a very small girl), bought a lot at the corner of what is now the intersection of Buxton and Hillsborough for the purpose of moving the old Free Presbyterian Church upon it and gave it to the Salvation Army.
This became their first Barracks. Later they permanently established themselves in the present Citadel on Great George St. It soon became obvious that these peculiar people not possessed with abundance of talent had a possession that moved mountains and drove out devils. The evidence of the Divine touch has marked a steady growth in all branches of its activities and its usefulness to the community and Island.
A mark of achievement and one which is complimentary to the youth workers of any religious body is the fact that this Corps has sent more young people to the National Training College than any other Corps in Canada. The youth activities are varied, embracing young people from the cradle until they pass along into maturity and take their place as citizens in a world brotherhood of mankind.
The uniform of the man or woman in blue no longer is the cause of ridicule as in former days, but can be found quietly moving amongst the people serving with heart to God and hand to man.

St. Patrick's Day Parade Programme

All that is needed Monday morning is fine weather and reasonably clear streets to complete the plans for the annual St. Patrick's Day parade. It will form up at the Canadian Legion and move off at 9.20 a.m. with the first stage taking the paraders down Grafton Street to Pownall and Kent and along Kent as far as CFCY where a St. Patrick's Day message will be delivered by the Benevolent Irish Society president Wilfrid J. Smith.

After Mass the group will return to the Legion Hall via Great George, Richmond, Prince, Kent, Queen and Grafton Streets where members of the Society will take part in the customary St. Patrick's Day entertainment.
The parade will be under the direction of Chief Marshal M. Leo Dowling, Sr., assisted by Mr. James Dowling and Mr. Fred Steele.

Acheson Accuses Russia of Phony Trade Conference

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14—(AP)—State Secretary Dean Acheson accused Russia today of planning to stage a phony international trade conference in Moscow April 3.
He said Soviet rulers were trying to "confuse and weaken" the west by encouraging such a meeting.
Communist radio and publications have been hallyouning the meeting for months. They claim at least 30 top-rank business men, educationists and peace-minded citizens from 40 to 50 countries will attend to work for more east-west trade.
About 30 Americans who are known to have been invited have refused to go for fear the conference would develop into a forum for propaganda attacks against the west.
S. Beryl Lush, Philadelphia cotton importer, had announced he was going "to drum up a little business" but in Philadelphia today he said:
"If my government feels the trip is not advisable, I won't go."
In denouncing the meeting today, Acheson called it "a Soviet creation" which is part of Moscow's anti-western propaganda barrage.

Counsel for the Crown in prosecuting the appeal was Mr. F. P. Varcoe, C.M.G., Q.C., Deputy Minister of Justice. Counsel for the respondent, upholding the earlier judgment of the Exchequer Court of Canada, were Messrs. D. L. Mathison, Q.C., and G. R. Foster. Judgment was reserved. They are expected back in Charlottetown this evening.

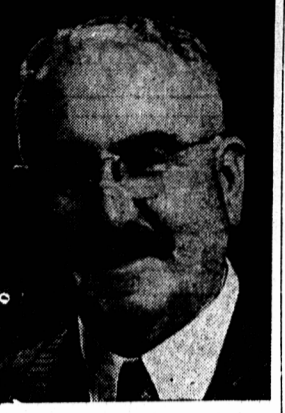

May Lift Meat Barriers Soon

Market-disrupting provincial barriers on the movement of livestock and meats soon may be lifted. Agriculture Minister Gardiner informed the Commons Friday that he had been in touch with British Columbia and Manitoba governments by telephone.
He said:
"Both are trying to work out some plan under which we may get rid of the restrictions which now are in effect."
Mr. Gardiner made no reference to Quebec and Nova Scotia which also have restrictions, but the Manitoba-B.C. embargoes are the toughest.
Fearing the possibility of foot-and-mouth disease spreading from south Saskatchewan, British Columbia has banned shipments of livestock and meats from Alberta and Eastern Provinces. Manitoba has imposed a ban on livestock and meats from Western Provinces.

Progressive Cornwall Farmer Uses Modern Snow Equipment

A snow blower attachment the tractor to go into the machine which fits onto any ordinary farm tractor may possibly prove the answer to the problem of removing the snow from city sidewalks. One of these machines has been a familiar sight in the village of Cornwall where the 300-yard driveway on the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon MacMillan has easily been kept open all winter. In addition the machine has blown a path on the road for a distance of a mile to the village and kept it open for cars and trucks.
Since the Government plows were busy on the highways, Mr. MacMillan was able to make travelling easy for himself and neighbors. He helped many of the latter to keep their driveways open as well.

Duplessis At Fraud Trial

QUEBEC, March 14—(CP)—Premier Duplessis testified at a fraud trial today that he never took seriously J. U. Gauthier's attempts to launch different industrial projects in the province.
Testifying at the preliminary hearing of Gauthier, charged with defrauding Dr. J. Arthur Smard, a St. Anne de Beaupre physician, of \$2,000, the Premier said: "I always thought your projects were promotion tactics to obtain money from those who had confidence in you."
Gauthier, a resident of St. Lambert, a nearby Montreal town, questioned the Premier himself after obtaining court permission. The defence lawyer told the court Gauthier was sincere in his attempts. "May God forgive me, I believe you are right," Judge Laetare Roy said. "I do not know whether the accused had the money necessary, but he had faith."
The judge will decide Monday whether or not there is sufficient evidence to warrant a trial.
