

The Heavens in November.

On the 1st of November, the planet Saturn will be in opposition to the sun, rising just as the sun sets. From the present until Saturn is considerably past opposition, opportunity for observation will be excellent, provided there is a reasonable amount of pleasant weather. The beautiful rings are now well spread out, the main division in them being visible with quite small telescopes. During opposition in the autumn of 1878, Saturn appeared like a globe impaled on a glowing red, the rings were so much foreshortened. For three years the position of planet with respect to the earth has been slowly changing, so the wonderful ring system is now visible in all its beauty. On the 6th of November

THE PLANET JUPITER,

which now shines just beneath the Pleiades will be in opposition. During opposition Jupiter will show to great advantage his immense globe. The great red spot is in its accustomed place, and the wonderful belt system is very finely planted on the great disc. Jupiter is now so near that his moons appear like considerable planets, as they are. It is believed that they may be inhabited. They appear quite large when in transit across the planet's disc.

On the 7th of November

THE PLANET MERCURY

will make a transit of the sun's disc. The phenomenon will not be visible here. The progress of the planet can be seen at Cleveland, Columbus and Cincinnati a little before sunset. At Denver, Colorado, ingress will take place at 3.16 p.m. On the Pacific coast the transit will be seen to excellent advantage.

THE PLANET MARS.

now rapidly approaching the two principal stars in the constellation of Gemini, is becoming a brilliant object in the late evening. Mars is approaching opposition for the second time since the discovery of his moons by Professor Asaph Hall, in 1877. The planet will be stationary on the 17th of November, and in opposition on the 27th of December. The planet is now an interesting object in the telescope. The gibbous phase is presented, and there is the appearance of a snow cap about the north pole. The disc presents curious markings of a green color. The outlines of these markings change from day to day, as the planet revolves on its axis. The possessors of large telescopes will again look for the day moons. It is probable that they may be seen by the middle of November, with good instruments.

THE CONSTELLATIONS

will present a grand spectacle in November. The winter constellation will have assumed full sway. Great Orion will rise betimes and display his glories during the entire night. Observers of the heavens always await his coming with pleasurable anticipations. His wonders are a life study. The constellation contains a first magnitude variable in Betelgeuse, and an intensely burning sun in Rigel, a vast accumulation of world stuff in the great nebula, and wonderful nebulae stars. The constellation is also remarkable for the number of its double stars.—Ez.
