Health Officer Clarifies Polio Shots' Intervals

In order to clarify the considerable amount of confusion regarding polio shots, Dr. Burton Howatt, public health officer, yesterday stated that the Connaught Laboratories, manufacturers of Salk vaccine, have issued the following instructions.

"It is not important when the second dose is given, provided it is not less than one month from the time of the first dose."

In regard to the interval between the second and third doses, Connaught Laboratories has this to say: "We do not know how long an interval may extend beyond seven months, but we would not feel that one year or even two years would be too long."

Dr. Howatt said that the policy of the Department of Health based on the above information now is: "The interval between the first and second doses may run from one month to two years, while the interval between the second and third doses may be anywhere between seven months and two years."

Dr. Howatt said there is still only one polio case in the Province. This case, involving a visitor from Montreal, is at Melville. He said there was absolutely no foundation to a report that several people were suffering from the disease in Summerside.

Enrollment Is New High At Montague

MONTAGUE — A beehive of activity since opening Wednesday, the two Montague schools have a record enrollment of 520 pupils, an increase of approximately 40 over last year. Sixty-seven pupils in grade 10 make up the largest class in the high school which has a total enrollment of 325.

Fourteen teachers and the principal, John Hughes, make up the high school staff and the 195 pupils in the memorial school from grades one to five have a staff of six, including their principal, Mrs. Elsie Waterworth.

A large number of rural pupils come in each year to take advantage of advanced courses and facilities of the senior grades.
