

# Canadiens In 5-1 Victory Over Leafs; Detroit-Boston Tied

MONTREAL, Nov. 29 — (CP)— Montreal Canadiens ran away from Toronto Maple Leafs tonight, rattling in five goals against the Leafs one before a jubilant home crowd of 14,542.

Maurice Richard scored two goals to lead Canadiens out of a three-game losing streak and leave them alone in third place in the National Hockey League standings.

Dick Gamble, Elmer Lach and Paul Meger scored Canadiens' other goals and Sid Smith got Toronto's lone tally. Despite their loss Toronto remained in second place.

All the scoring came in the last two periods, Canadiens hammering in three in the middle period.

Richard's goals sent his season's total to 15 and his N. H. L. career total to 307, only 17 short of the record of Nels Stewart of the old Montreal Maroons.

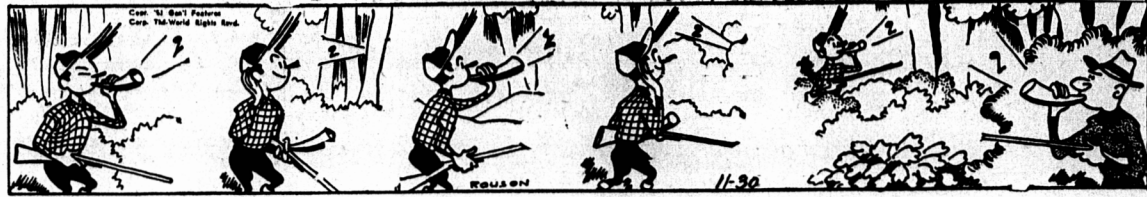

# P.E.I. Rifle Association Annual Meeting Held; Active Year Reported

Brigadier W. W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D., was re-elected President of the Provincial Rifle Association last night at the well attended annual meeting of the Association aboard the H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse was re-elected Patron of the Association and Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O. and Col. D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O. were re-elected Honorary Presidents.

The vice-presidents for each of the Counties were all re-elected and they are as follows: Queen's Major J. M. Jones; Prince, Sgt. G. A. Coles; King's, Major John A. MacDonald. The members of the Council were all re-elected except the President whose place was taken by Capt. J. J. Connolly, Lt. Col. J. J. Trainor and W. R. Crockett, York were elected to the council for the first time.

Excellent reports were presented by the President Brigadier Reid and the secretary-treasurer Col. W. J. MacDonnell. Col. MacDonnell also presented reports for the inter-Maritime meet of last summer and for the financial matters taken by Major A. F. Gormley, Lt. Percy Horeck reported on an Ottawa dinner meeting at which were representatives from every province in the Dominion.

C. P. O. Bowles presented a report on the condition of the rifles which were given out last year. All the rifles were returned in a good condition except one, he stated and he suggested that the rifles be handed in the same manner next year.

Following the annual meeting of the members an executive meeting was held at which Col. MacDonnell was re-appointed secretary-treasurer. Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonnell was re-appointed range officer and Lt. G. J. Rogers was appointed chairman of the Council.

Lt. G. J. Rogers was appointed to the Island representation on the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association. Other Island men on the Association are Capt. A. J. MacCabe, Major A. F. Gormley, Brigadier Reid and Captain Earl Burke.

Brigadier Reid on behalf of the immediate past president Col. D. A. MacKinnon expressed the lat-

ter's regrets that he could not attend the meeting. Col. MacKinnon extended his congratulations to Father George MacDonald for winning a place on the 1952 Blesley team. He also extended his congratulations to Miss Mary MacLennan and to Sgt. G. A. Coles for their showing last summer and he extended his best wishes to the Association for a successful year.

A motion of appreciation to Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonnell, range officer, was passed by the meeting. The motion asked that Lt. Col. MacDonnell be thanked for his splendid work and assistance.

The financial report showed that the Association was in a satisfactory financial condition. The report on the inter-Maritime Rifle meet by Col. MacDonnell noted that the score made by the Island team last summer was the highest made in the meet by any team since the end of the war, with the exception of 1951.

Nova Scotia, however, won the meet with the score of 796 which was phenomenal, he stated. Island teams won the meet in the four previous years with scores of 745-773-754-742. The score for the Island team last summer was 781.

A complete review of the Ottawa meet was prepared by Major Gormley. In the report he noted that the total winnings for the team amounted to \$622.77.

He also made the following suggestions: 1. That the requisitions for cubicles and accommodations be made well in advance of the Ottawa Shoot; 2. That the members of the P. E. I. team shoot under the same unit rifle association; 3. That cadets take part in the miniature rifle shoots at Ottawa and be required to make a certain average at the Provincial Shoot to qualify for Ottawa.

# Marty Marion Signs Contract With Browns

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 29 — (AP)— Marty Marion was back in St. Louis major league baseball today.

The smiling thin man, fired only recently as manager of St. Louis Cardinals, signed two contracts with St. Louis Browns for a three-year hitch. One contract was as a coach and the other as a player.

That's because Marty feels sure that he is about to overcome a bad knee and back which last season kept him from his 11-year stand in the Cardinal infield where he became known as Mr. Shortstop.

Owner Bill Veeck, at the signing today, explained that while Marion was nailed down by two contracts he could leave the Browns any time he gets a chance to manage a major league club.

To get Marion, it was reported that Veeck had to put \$15,000 a year on the line as a coach and another \$10,000 or so if he makes his comeback as a shortstop.

Marty is reported to have got around \$35,000 for his one year as manager of the Cardinals.

Marty says his knee is well. He was out last season following an operation on it. His bad back? Well, he says, his physician thinks if he keeps on taking prescribed strengthening exercises it should be in shape by spring.

The 33-year-old Marion turned down an attractive offer with Boston Braves because "I wanted to stay in St. Louis."

When Marion was dropped as Cardinal manager it generally was understood that owner Fred Saigh felt he lacked aggressiveness. Saigh still is on a hunt for a manager. The word is that he has his eye on fiery Eddie Stankey, New York Giant second baseman.
