They were being forwarded from Prince Edward Island to Boston, and had been invoiced at thirty dozen to the case, but it was found that the boxes had been raised so as to allow of an extra six dozen to each. His worship remanded him to jail for a couple of days to give him an opportunity of sampling prison fare, after which he will receive his trial.

COMING FROM THE STATES.—Says the Calgary Herald of Nov. 2nd: The train for the north this morning carried a large number of passengers, among whom were some 30 delegates from the states of Washington and Idaho, who, having heard much of northern Alberta as a desirable home for settlers, are here for the purpose of selecting lands upon which to settle. They are a fine class of men and are all well to do. Some of them have brought their stock and effects along, and will not return to the States, the balance, however, after they have chosen a location, will go back, returning to Alberta in the spring with their families and possessions. Twenty more delegates from Washington state arrived in Calgary this morning. They will go north on Thursday. Says the Vancouver News-Advertiser: A large number of farmers from Washington state have this year emigrated to Alberta by this route (the Columbia and Kootenay Navigation company), and last week the steamer Columbia had on board no less than 20 families from that locality.
