KING'S COUNTY EXHIBITION AND RACES.

Matches at Georgetown To-day.

GEORGETOWN, Oct. 1. A special train for Georgetown left Charlottetown at 9 o'clock this morning, and reached its destination shortly after 11. Among those on board were: Hon. J. R. McLean, Commissioner of Public Works; A. B. Warburton, M. L. A.; James Currie, Collector of Customs; Rev. J. C. McLean, Edward Bayfield, W. S. Stewart, W. S. McKie, Walter Matheson, Milton Walsh, John Horne, David McInnis, Richard Burke, H. Morris, and representatives of the Charlottetown press.

THE RACES. There was a strong wind blowing across the track, which was in fair condition and the attendance of spectators was fairly large.

The track was under the direction of the following officers: Judges—Dr. Stewart, Georgetown, starter; Oliver Masson, Southport, and John McDonald, Souris. Timers—Thomas Morrissey, Georgetown; Milton Walsh, Charlottetown. Clerk of the course—George Poole.

THE FREE-FOR-ALL. The races were called at 1.45, the free-for-all being the first event.

The starters were Lawn Dominic, Billy McKie, Hatusu, and Lawn Dominic third. On the last stretch Hatusu took the lead at the first turn, and held it throughout, winning by two lengths over Billy McKie, with Hatusu third. Hatusu held second place until coming under the wire at the half where Billy McKie passed her.—Time, 2.36.

The second of the second heat was a poor one for Lawn Dominic. At the first turn Hatusu was leading with Billy McKie second and Lawn Dominic third. On the last stretch Hatusu and Lawn Dominic were fighting hard for second place, but Hatusu fell to third position on the home stretch. Hatusu and Billy McKie were almost neck and neck as they came under the wire. The judges gave the heat to Billy McKie, Lawn Dominic third. Time.

Hatusu injured one of her hind legs while being removed from the car, and therefore raced under considerable disadvantage.

GREEN RACE. In the green race there were three starters, Rollo Bay Boy, Sadie and Echo, their positions being in the order named.

The lead at the first course was a bad one for the pole horse. Sadie held the lead at the first turn, when she was passed by Rollo Bay Boy. The latter did not hold the lead long however, as Sadie again forged ahead and secured a lead, which she held to the finish, winning by two lengths; Rollo Bay Boy second, and Echo third. Time, 2.23.

Second Heat.—In the second heat of the green race Sadie took the lead at the start, and was never headed, winning by two or three lengths; Rollo Bay Boy second, and Echo third. Time 3.01.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 26.—The Right Rev. William Crosswell Doane, vice-chancellor of the university of the state and presiding bishop of the diocese of Albany, was asked to give his views to the Associated Press upon the alleged suggestion of Bishop Potter, of New York, to change the name of the Episcopal Church to that of "The Holy Catholic Church," and said:

"In the first place, I am inclined to believe that Bishop Potter has been misquoted or misapprehended. He was not proposing a change of the legal name of the church or usurpation of the term 'catholic,' but a title to be used by the church. I do not believe that there is within the Episcopal church any man or set of men who would be either so egotistical or arrogant as to suggest the usurpation of our particular religious body of the term, 'The Holy Catholic church,' a term that belongs at once to the whole Christ believing world. My own idea is to retain without change the title Episcopal church for all forms and for use in the world at large. I would, however, make a change in the title page of our prayer book by broadening its scope. Instead of having it read, as it does now, 'The book of common prayer and administration of the sacraments and other rites and ceremonies of the church, according to the use of the Episcopal church in the United States of America,' I would have it read simply 'The book of common prayer and administration of the sacraments and other rites and ceremonies of the church.' That would allow the use of our prayer book by any church, and would designate our belief that ours was the faith."

CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 29.—The Spanish residents are holding meetings at the Spanish club to discuss Cuban affairs. There is much excitement among them over the manifestation on the part of the masses in sympathy with Cuban patriots and their daily organ charges that some of the police and judicial authorities have displayed partiality when the populace were insulting Spain. The article concludes with the warning that if blood flows here in the streets over the Spanish question, the authorities will have to bear the blame. The popular demonstration of sympathy with Cuba proceeds in part from the dislike of the lower classes for the Spaniards.

LONDON, September 29.—The Pall Mall Gazette publishes a special despatch from Tananariva, Madagascar, which says Gen. Duchesne has been obliged to fall back upon Mevatanana, withdrawing his advance guard, which has reached Kinjaly, sixty miles from Antananarivo. The retreat of the French has restored the confidence of the Malagasy. A large quantity of arms has reached the capital. In consequence people who formerly were thinking of flight are now volunteering to go to the front. The physical condition of the French troops at Mevatanana is such that there are hardly two hundred effective men left.

LONDON, September 29.—The Standard publishes a letter from its Moscow correspondent, saying that great preparations are already being made for the coronation of the Czar in the spring as an outdoor work is impossible during the winter. The government has allotted 6,500,000 roubles and the municipal authorities have voted 500,000 roubles more for a proper observance of the occasion. The competition to secure 20,000 roubles for the rent of a house for a month during the coronation.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—A despatch from Shanghai says the inquiry into the Chinese outrages at Kuchang has abruptly concluded. The viceroy's deputy, according to the despatches, declares the investigation has gone far enough, and that ample justice has been done. A soldier insulted Mr. Mansfield, the British consul at Kuchang, and spat in his face. The man was bastinadoed, receiving fifty strokes as punishment for the offence. The demonstration of the powerful British squadron proceeding up the Yang Tze River is in consequence of the refusal of the Peking government to satisfy the demands of the Marquis of Salisbury for the punishment of the late viceroy of Szo Chuen whom British Minister O'Connor reported as being responsible for the outrages beginning in May at the Mission stations at Chang Fu, which were followed by the massacre of Ku Cheng. The decisive attitude of England disposes of the proposal to withdraw the missionaries to treaty ports. It is understood the U. S. government, although not actively co-operated with the British, have plans to protect the missions, which involve the strongest practical measures, in the event of the mere squadron demonstration not proving sufficient to wake up the government at Peking.
