LONDON, Jan. 14. H. R. H. the Duke of Clarence and Avondale died at nine o'clock yesterday morning. Cardinal Manning died yesterday morning.

Anti-Jewish Riots.

VIENNA, Jan. 14. In the recent anti-Jewish riots in the districts of Ponsa and Svatoff, in Russia, several hundred Jews were wounded, ninety houses destroyed and two thousand Jewish families reduced to beggary. The police made no effort to check the rioters.

Bye-Elections.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14. The dates of some of the elections in Ontario have been altered. Elections will take place in Lennox, Prince Edward, North and South Victoria, on February 4th, and in East Bruce on February 11. The new Minister of Public Works will face his constituents in February.

Victory Anticipated.

ALEXANDRIA, Jan. 14. To-morrow's pollings in Glangarry promise a splendid victory for Major McLennan, the Government candidate. There is a large French vote in the country and this element promises a loyal support to the Liberal Conservative standard bearer.

Death of a Song Writer.

BOSTON, Jan. 14. Charles A. White, the famous song writer is dead. He composed over 1,600 popular pieces during his lifetime, including "Marguerite," "Come Birds, Come," and "Put Me in My Little Bed."

Death of a Well-Known Captain.

MONTREAL, Jan. 14. Captain John Dick, for many years port warden at Quebec, and well-known to all maritime ship masters, is dead.

HALIFAX, Jan. 14. Mr. H. L. Jones has been chosen the Liberal-Conservative candidate for Digby.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—The Grand Jury in their presentment to-day, complimented the Government on the energetic measures taken to eliminate booting in connection with public expenditures.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—The Senate today in executive session ratified the general act signed at Brussels on July 2nd, 1890, by seventeen powers, including the United States, for the suppression of the African slave trade; also the convention of commerce and navigation between the United States and the independent state of Congo, signed at Brussels on July 24th, 1890.

MONTREAL, Jan. 12.—Fire broke out in the convent of the Sacred Heart, corner Sherbrooke and St. Hyppolite Streets, this morning. Considerable damage was done by water and smoke. In connection with the convent is a reformatory for young children, and among these there was much confusion. Several firemen were overcome by smoke and had to be taken to the hospital. One nun was so seriously burned that her death is feared. Two servants were also seriously burned.
