#### Reply to "Traveller."

"This is true Liberty, when free-born men having to advise the public, may speak free."

SIR,—Over the non de plume of "Traveller," a short article appears in your issue of 14th inst., which betrays the spirit of intolerance and bigotry that one might expect from a modern Torquemada. With the first part of his article I have nothing to say, but when "Traveller" endeavors to foist the views of this own class and creed on unbelievers, it is time he be given a chance to see himself as others see him. If he will take the trouble to examine statistics and the annals of our courts, he will find that he possibly belongs to a class which may be characterized as the most criminal. Let him discover how many "unbelievers" have been before our courts or otherwise convicted of crimes and immoralities, and compare them with the number of his own class and cloth who have been similarly situated. I will not draw the comparison. Let the learned and brainy "Traveller" do so himself and no doubt he will be astonished to find the favorable light in which the unbeliever will appear. I do not wish to animadvert upon the church connections of the principals and witnesses to the Queen vs. Weeks case. We believe it would be doing an injustice by implication to moral believers. But it is notorious that with possibly one exception, they were all believers; and if any perjury was committed, certainly unbelievers are not to blame. I am astonished to think that a man like "Traveller," who pretends to be possessed of brains and education, and to hold sacred convictions, would so far violate common decency as to seek to slander a class merely because they were unbelievers, knowing full well that it is only a few days since one of his brethren was convicted, in your city, of falsehood, etc.

"Traveller" says: "The eternal laws of justice are the basis of all civil law, and an unbeliever, if he be consistent, would ignore both the law and the lawgiver." Indeed! In the case of civil law, who is the lawgiver? Are unbelievers more lawless than believers? Let the public courts answer; let unprejudiced public opinion answer; let common sense answer.

The unbeliever knows full well and feels it, that with him there is no dodging consequences. He has no moral bankrupt court in which he may heap his sins upon the innocent. He knows, or thinks he does, that there is no way by which he can have his guilt washed white as wool. All that "Traveller" or his like have to do is to repent and throw his sins on ignominy, and behold, the moral leprosy is cured. If "Traveller" or his ilk had the power, he

would bring untold misery upon the state. The Star Chamber, the Auto-da-fé, and the Iron Boot, would take the place of anathemas and theological odium.

The unfortunate railway official who has dared to express an honest thought, would then find himself in the position of Servetus, burned at the stake, whilst "Traveller," in imitation of Calvin, would warm himself at the fire in which the philo-sophic dissenter was being roasted.

In civilized countries—England, France, the United States—the unbeliever's affirmation is as good any day in the week as the fetish oak of the believer, and this will be recognized in Canada, too, before long. And this is what should be. A man who is honestly an unbeliever for want of sufficient evidence, is surely more reliable than one who is ready to swallow all and everything that is told him without question. "Traveller" surely has forgotten some of the texts of the blessed Book, such as "Judge not, that ye be not judged," "Swear not at all,"—but he seems to think his commission is "not to bring peace but a sword." MORE GOLD.—The Halifax Mail says there is considerable excitement in and near Truro over a rich piece of gold in alluvial mud two miles or so from Brookfield. The gold is in grains, some quite large, resembling miniature snow flakes, and is obtained by washing. The spot where the gold is found is the bed of an old river, and the lead from whence the gold came is declared by knowing ones to be not far away.

SERIOUS GUNNING ACCIDENT.—At Abbeville, N. B., on last Tuesday, Thomas Kilpatrick, a lad about 15 years of age, was preparing to go shooting, and while handling the loaded gun, muzzle upward, it was accidentally discharged, shattering the arm and mutilating a portion of his shoulder, necessitating the amputating of the entire limb.

ADVANCE IN PRICES.—The Halifax Chronicle says:—Advice received yesterday from Chicago state that there was great excitement in the produce and provision markets there owing to wheat advancing about nine cents per bushel, which is equivalent to nearly fifty cents per barrel on flour, while pork jumped up \$5 per barrel. Plate beef also advanced fifty cents per barrel, and corn about four cents per bushel. Millers in Ontario have advanced flour in most cases about 35 cents per barrel, and look for still higher prices, as in all sections wheat is reported very scarce.

NEW L. C. R. TIME TABLE.—The Moncton Times says: It is understood that the summer time table of the L. C. R. is in course of preparation. There will be considerable change in the time of the C. P. R. trains, both of which will pass through Moncton in the night. It is reported that the Quebec will reach Moncton two hours earlier than at present, and that the Shediac morning train to St. John will again run as an accommodation. There is some talk also of having the morning train from St. John pass here an hour or more later than usual, in order that the Island boats to Point du Chene may make connections by that train with points east. The details, however, have not yet been announced.
