The New British Ministry.

The House of Lords yesterday adopted all amendments to the Redistribution Bill, which passed in the House of Commons. The House then adjourned until Thursday.

The following completes the list of the New Cabinet, called yesterday. Postmaster General, Lord John Manners. Attorney General for Ireland, Mr. Holmes.

Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, Henry Chaplin. Edward Gibson, besides being Lord Chancellor of Ireland, will have a seat in the Cabinet, which is an unusual honor.

Parliamentary Secretary to India office, Lord Harris. Secretary to the Admiralty, Charles T. Ritchie. Civil Lord of the Admiralty, Ellis Ashmead Bartlett.

Sir Charles Dilke, addressing a meeting of Liberals, said he wished to study in Ireland the plan for devolution from Parliament to Welsh, Scotch and Irish bodies much of the business that Parliament is now not competent to discharge.

Big Bear's Prisoners Garrisoning the Northwest.

All prisoners from Big Bear's camp were brought in to-night. McLean said that though they suffered much hardship, it might have been worse. They are all in good health. No personal insult was offered any of them.

The troops will leave at once for East and go by Lake Winnipeg. Winnipeg A & B Batteries and Quebec School Cavalry, will remain at Battleford as a Government camp. They will garrison Qu'Appelle, Humboldt, Fort Pitt, Edmonton and Prince Albert, in addition to the Mounted Police.

A Builder Sentenced.

Charles A. Buddenswick, builder, whose row of buildings fell and caused the death of Louis Walker, was to-day sentenced to ten years' imprisonment and a fine of \$500.
