An instructive talk on highway safety was given at Rotary yesterday by Corporal Allan M. Johnston of the R.C.M.P.

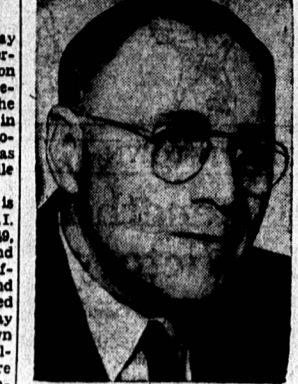

3. Extension of subsidies paid to doctors in isolated areas and the payment of similar subsidies to dentists and possibly nurses.

4. Increases in the annual grants by Newfoundland and the Maritime Provinces to the medical and dental faculties of Dalhousie University.

5. Establishment of a modern cancer clinic at Victoria General Hospital in Halifax.

6. Establishment of a communicable diseases section, with a subsection to care for polio victims, at Victoria General Hospital; a provincial rehabilitation centre, also at Victoria General.

7. Development of a training school for victims of cerebral palsy; and expansion and modernization of the schools for the deaf and the blind.

8. Establishment of regional hospitals for the care of the chronically ill to replace the present county homes and hospitals.
