INVOLUNTARY AERONAUTICS.

THRILLING ADVENTURE OF A BOY WITH A MAMMOT KITE.

A very singular occurrence took place on Friday last, near Bridgeport, which has a dangerous aspect on a boyish sport that has hitherto been considered quite a pastime.

All things prepared, two companions "boosted" the artificial bird to the proper angle, and it flew into the air like a thing of life.

The ambitious boy had reached the height of success in aeronautics, and he gazed in rapture on the kite, that looked more like a speck on the sky, fully a quarter of a mile away.

THE HURRICANE IN THE WEST INDIES.

The steamer Morro Castle, which reached New York from Havana, after a tempestuous voyage, on Sunday evening, brought full details of the great hurricane of the 7th and 8th instants.

The damage to property is estimated at five millions of dollars. Seven hundred and fifty street lamps were washed away. The stock of sugar and molasses in the warehouses, boats, lighters, &c.

on lives were lost in the city from the storm, and in the bay eleven. Of thirteen vessels in port, four were lost—the Spanish barque M. E., (captain and six sailors drowned), the Spanish schooner Rosita and Florida Palace, and American schooner Valeria.

In Nueva Paz, 116 houses, mostly of wood, and of small dimensions, were changed in a few hours to heaps of ruin; in Matanzas, 100; in Guines, 68; (church tower also down); in Alacranes, 20; in Bejuac, 40, and so on.

The growing cane was generally prostrated, and its final yield probably reduced by one-third or more, which means from 300,000 to 400,000 boxes of sugar less in the coming crop.

The losses in the city of Matanzas are estimated at \$5,000,000. The total losses, immediate and remote, are summed up by Havana merchants at over \$20,000,000.

Poor desolate Cuba has yet again passed through the furnace. Hardly had the details of the cyclone of the 7th and 8th been recorded, when we learn that another portion of the Island was scourged on the 19th and 20th.

The resolve of Prussia to have a strong navy becomes very apparent. She had before the war fifteen iron-clad frigates and about twenty first and second-class gunboats—the most efficient of them having been built after English and French models in the dockyards of Blackwall and Toulon.
