## THE CAMPAIGN IN INDIA.

Tribesmen Expelled from Arhanga Pass.

## THE MAE MULLAH HAS FLED.

British Sustain a Trifling Loss.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—According to a despatch from Karapna, the expected advance to Arhanga pass was made yesterday morning. General Westmacott, seized the village covering the line of the advance, and his artillery, brought into action at half-past eight o'clock, soon expelled the tribesmen from the Saugars. Only a slight opposition was encountered when the crest was reached and the pass captured at half past ten o'clock. The British sustained only a trifling loss.

The Mullah of Saidakbar has fled and Sir William Lockhart is now descending into the Afridis territory.

## GERMANY AND HAYTI.

Fatherland Must be Mollified.

An Indemnity Demanded.

PORT AU PRINCE, Hayti, Nov. 1.—Serious trouble has arisen between Hayti and Germany.

The German minister to this republic, Count Schwerere has hauled down his flag and according to the current report, three German warships are expected here to back up the ultimatum of that Minister to Hayti, demanding an indemnity for the alleged illegal arrest and imprisonment of a German citizen named Linders.

## NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTIONS.

Government Probably Defeated.

## THE LEADER AND HIS COLLEAGUES SLAIN IN TRINITY.

Where is Mr. Bower's Now?

St. John's, Nfld, Nov. 1.—The count of the election returns in Trinity, though little over half known as yet, already shows pretty clearly that Sir William Whiteway and his colleagues have been deeply scored in that constituency. The figures so far, for the Government candidates are: Whiteway, 539; Johnson, 492; Gu-bue, 568. But for the opposition candidates they are: Brinner, 1034; Marc, 836; Watson, 941. How great is the revolution here will be appreciated when it is remembered that at the last election the Whitesites carried Trinity by six hundred majority.

The count, so far in Trinity, not only justifies the conclusion that the whole opposition ticket will be returned in that constituency by a large majority, but there is a strong belief that as Trinity goes so goes the whole colony.

In the last house the parties stood, government 22, opposition, 14, giving the government, with the speaker in the chair, a majority of 7. If the opposition have merely held their own in the constituencies not heard from, the Whiteway government are now in a minority; and if the opposition have gained, in the other constituencies, anything like they have in the constituencies heard from, the opposition have a large majority.

St. John's, Nov. 1.—Dr. Travers, son of Dr. Boyle Travers, has been appointed assistant Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum, vice Dr. Steeves, resigned.

Andrew Inches, Deputy Surveyor General, died yesterday at Fredericton, aged eighty.

The first important football game of the season was played here on Saturday, when the St. John B & A Club team beat the University of New Brunswick, 12 to 0.

The village of Hampton Station had a bad fire on Saturday. The houses burned included the Methodist parsonage, and the dwellings of Mr. Evanson, William McManus and E. G. Evans.

## ORIGIN OF NATIONS.

Brittany is inhabited by the descendants of the original Britons or Bretons. The Austrians were originally the Oester-Reichers, or inhabitants of the Eastern empire.

The Hittites were first mentioned about 900 B. C. as a commercial and military nation to the north of Palestine.

The Wends of northeastern Germany were a branch of the Slavonians, who settled along the sea in the sixth century.

The Romanians are descendants of the Romans who conquered and occupied a portion of the territory now called Roumania.

The Albanians are descended from the Alemanni, who, in the fourth century, settled in the country where their descendants still remain.

The unspeakable Turk is descended from a race of thieves and murderers, who first appeared in history in the tenth century. Turks came from the steppes of central Asia and were of Tartar origin.

The Romans never made any impression upon the Germans, even Caesar failing in his attempts to invade the country beyond the Rhine. The army of Varrus, the Roman general, was annihilated by Arminius or Hermann in the Teutoburg battle.

The Carthaginians became a nation in the ninth century B. C., with the founding of their city by Dido, or Elissa, as she was also called. She was a princess of Tyre, and her husband being killed by Pygmalion, the king, and her own life threatened she fled with a number of adherents and started a new colony.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

## WAR FEELING IN CHINA.

The Gathering of Foreign Fleets said to Alarm the Natives.

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 29.—The S. S. Empress of Japan, arrived from China, brings news that the rapid increase of men of war of different nationalities in Chinese waters is being viewed with considerable alarm by the people and the government of China, and the different eastern colonies are greatly alarmed over the situation. Each nation is rapidly adding vessels to its squadron. The moment a new vessel arrives for one boat, other squadrons immediately notify headquarters, and if a new vessel is not sent a smaller one is recalled and a larger and more powerful one is sent in its place. There are now more than two hundred and fifty foreign cruisers, battle ships and gunboats, besides over a hundred torpedo boats on the Chinese station, and as there is nothing for any of them to do at present, save the small river gunboats, which are kept busy putting down pirates, it seems that each nation is jealously watching the other. In Hong Kong, the increasing squadrons are the sole topic of conversation at clubs, on the streets, and everywhere else where men do congregate, and the prevailing opinion is that there is trouble ahead or there would be no occasion for these significant preparations. Many naval and military men at the different naval stations in Chinese waters, according to the officers of the Empress of Japan, are publicly advocating better armament of their forces, for they fear that the quietude now prevailing there will soon be disturbed. The present calm, during which all the preparations are being made on land and sea—for the military have bought new barracks at Hong Kong and on every station they are busily recruiting their forces—is just the calm which precedes a storm.

It is between Russia and Japan that the trouble is expected, and with these nations at war in all probability other nations would be dragged into the imbroglio. Russia of late has been overstepping the limits in her land-grabbing schemes in the Orient. Russian agents are everywhere, and Corea and Northern China are overrun with them. They are working at present secretly, but if expectations are realized, will break out openly soon, claim and take by force a portion of Corea, and much of Northern China.
