

Virus Research Centre Opened

OTTAWA (CP)—The health department's new \$1,500,000 virus research laboratory, only place in Canada devoted solely to this work, was officially opened Thursday.

Equipped with the latest research and safety features, it will test polio vaccines and prepare diagnostic serums for influenza, polio, hepatitis and numerous other diseases.

In opening the imposing three-story structure of yellow brick and stone, Health Minister Martin described it as perhaps the most modern of its kind in Canada. It added to Canada's stature as one of the world's leaders in virus research.

One of the laboratory's main functions will be testing the safety of polio vaccine manufactured at the Connaught Laboratories in Toronto. It will analyse reports of provincial health departments on virus diseases.

clude the incinerating of air as it leaves the building from its contaminated testing rooms. Each section of the building is separated by double-doored air locks or changing rooms in which staff observe sanitary procedures.

No research work will be done on humans in the laboratory. It will be confined to some 500 monkeys, found most effective for experiments with polio vaccine, and to mice and guinea pigs.

Safety features are designed to avoid cross-infections among the animals used. After the individual monkeys have served their purpose they will be cremated inside the building to remove all trace of virus.

Eight distinct air-conditioning systems have been incorporated in the laboratory to ensure a clean and uninfected atmosphere for staff members.

The laboratory is the first of a number of units of the health department to be located in this Ottawa district, and Mr. Martin said the department's entire headquarters operations eventually would be housed there. Already under construction is a new headquarters building for the food and drug divisions.

RESEARCH USED

Research work already is under way in the laboratory and when it is in full operation next month it will have a staff of 30 to 40 specially-trained workers.
