**HALIFAX (CP)** — The weather office says cloudy skies and showers were reported over Cape Breton and the Strait of Canso Tuesday night. ### Harbor Contract Awarded

**CAPITAL BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
OTTAWA — Formal announcement of the awarding of a contract for harbor improvements at Souris was made here Tuesday by Public Works Minister George McRae. Morrison and McRae Limited of Summerside have been awarded a \$98,346 contract which was the lower of two opened on April 27. High bid was \$104,527. The work will consist of constructing the second stage of an enclosed boat harbor which was begun in 1965. The second stage will be similar in construction to the first in that materials used will include creosoted timber cribwork with concrete cope walls on the exposed seaward side and steel pile bents on the sheltered harbor side. It will be decked with reinforced concrete. When completed, the area enclosed by the walls of the boat harbor will be about 400 by 400 feet. The purpose is to provide shelter for small fishing boats. Work is to be completed in 12 months. Plans and specifications were prepared by the district engineer at Charlottetown for the federal department of public works.

### Club Committee Commences Work

**MONTAGUE** — An objective of four greens to be built this year was set at a meeting of the Brudenell Golf Club held in the Legion Home at Montague last night. Work will commence immediately on these new greens. In the past month the fairways of the nine hole course had been cleared of winter rubbish, pine trees have been planted, tees have been built, benches have been placed and two men are presently employed clearing surplus brush in preparation for the summer. It was decided to open the large home at the course for a clubhouse, in which a canteen could be maintained and where green fees could be paid and golf supplies purchased. Two applications for caretaker had been received and a decision to allow the caretaker and his family living in accommodations for the year around was reached. The caretaker will take up residence as soon as school closes. Reports of committees were heard with Jack Murphy presenting the rules committee report, Harry Galloway the work committee report, Duke MacDonald the greens committee report. Six ladies were present for the meeting and were formed into a committee to take care of the canteen operation with directions and assistance from George Nicholson. ## Alex B. Campbell Promises Increase

Immediately on election, a Liberal government will pay all old age pensioners \$100 a month, Party Leader Alex B. Campbell announced to an audience of 400 people at a public meeting in Englewood Regional High School auditorium at Crapaud last night. "This is an absolute guarantee," Mr. Campbell stated. "The provincial government will accept full responsibility for the \$5 increase and it will be granted without recourse to any means test."

Mr. Campbell stated that amounts up to \$125 would be available "to those in need" through the Canada Assistance Act which is shortly to be dealt with by Parliament.

### ESTABLISH COUNCIL

Mr. Campbell said a Liberal undertaking to establishing a "research and productivity council" would involve "enlisting the participation of Islanders of all walks of life in a rural development program which would be all-embracing in its scope."

Membership of the council would include Island leaders in the field of science, agriculture, fishing, business, education and industry with outside consultants brought in whenever it seemed advisable.

"But primarily it would be an effort by Islanders, for Islanders," he said, "to find new and more profitable uses for all our natural and human resources. We would seek to encourage greater productivity in every direction and every endeavour so that there would be increased prosperity for all."

"We shall do our utmost," Mr. Campbell pledged "to establish conditions favourable to the retention of our own young people and to attract outside people who can help us in a great

The Liberal leader stressed that in seeking to broaden our economic base through increased diversification in industry and commerce, "sight would never be lost of the fact that agriculture is and will remain the backbone of our Island economy."

(Continued from page 1) the men at sea and antiquated shipping legislation.

The 62,500-member Seamen's union wants a reduction to 40 hours from 56 in the work week without loss of pay. The ship owners want the reduction spread over two years, saying the demand represents a 17-percent wage increase.

The labor department reports 6,500,000 manual employees in manufacturing industry earn an average of about \$20 (\$60) for a 46-hour work week, counting overtime and bonuses.

Union sources put the seaman's wage at about \$15 (\$45) for a 56-hour week. In addition he receives free board and berth. To earn \$20, a seaman would work an average of 75 to 80 hours a week. A proper comparison complicated by differences between pay at sea and in port. Although the seaman has his fare provided aboard ship, he may pay rent and buy groceries for his family in port.
