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N.S.-Built Steel Trawler Considered Sign of Times

HALIFAX (CP) — The first steel trawler built in Nova Scotia came down the ways recently, a sign of the times in the province's fishing industry. The ship was built by Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation's shipyards for Lunenburg Sea Products Limited, a subsidiary of the company from Doseo by Sea Products.

Built at a cost of \$900,000, the Cape Ann is 141 feet long and 32 tons. With a 26-foot beam, she is 15 feet deep to the main deck. Inside, she's designed for fish and fishing. The 8,000-cubic-foot capacity fish hold is refrigerated. Compartments, pens and shelves are arranged in it to keep the fish on top from damaging the fish on the bottom through excessive weight.

The Cape Ann is powered by a 750-horsepower diesel engine which will give a service speed of 11 knots, and there will be a variety of electronic equipment for navigation, communication and fish-finding installed before she sails on her first trip. The Cape Ann, like the Tribal class destroyers built by Doseo, was constructed in sections in the shipyard's prefabrication shop. After the bow and stern sections of the ship were assembled, they were assembled in her home, a time she has always faithfully observed.

Put Frosting On Cake
For That Icy Glamour

BETTER ICE CAKE WHEN it's to be served with coffee as a dessert or at an informal "dessert and coffee party" given after dinner for friends. The cake looks more glamorous when leaved and the flavor of the frosting blends to perfection with coffee.

In today's mocha cake, coconut is added to the batter, adding richer flavor, interesting texture and pleasant moistness. The crown of coconut atop suggests the goodness beneath.

This cake is made by the one-hour method popular in the last decade, a method we should often use today.

In our test kitchen we used a portable electric mixer which alternately add remaining sugar and stir in chocolate mix, beating well after each addition; add vanilla; gradually stir in remaining milk. Makes about 3 1/2 cups.
