Plans Finalized For Fire Chiefs Convention

Plans for the first Maritime Fire Chiefs convention ever to be held in Summerside have just about been finalized by the committee in charge and the programme for the four-day assembly which opens on Monday, July 16th has been drawn up and approved by Fire Chief W. B. MacNeill and Assistant Fire Chief Claude Kenny.

Registration will open on Monday at 4:00 p.m. at the Town Hall and at 10:00 p.m. there will be a buffet lunch served in the Chamber. On Tuesday morning the official opening will take place at Coyle's Restaurant at 10:00 o'clock presided over by the president, Chief Stanley Scott of Glouce Bay, N. S., followed by the invocation by Rev. J. A. LeClair. The official welcome to the delegates will be extended by His Worship W. Henry Wedge and a memorial service conducted by Rev. K. G. Sullivan will follow.

C. A. Thompson, Dominion Fire Commissioner, Ottawa, will address the Fire Chiefs at 11:00 a.m. and at noon there will be a short business session and the appointment of any necessary committees will be made. Luncheon will be served at 12:30. During the afternoon, starting at 2:00 o'clock, moving pictures will be shown. The ladies of the party will be driven to Charlottetown by car at 3:00 p.m. and will visit the Confederation Chamber and afterwards treated to a shore dinner at Cavendish.

On Wednesday morning beginning at 9:30 various fire marshals including S. S. Wright Halifax, Clare Young, Fredericton, N. B. and Arthur Campbell, Charlottetown will address the chiefs on matters of their particular concern.

Following lunch which will be at 12:00 noon, Earl Sturgeon, deputy fire marshal, Fredericton, N.B. will address the delegates on fire prevention. A business meeting and round table conference will be held at 3:00 p.m. Afternoon tea will be served to the ladies at four o'clock at the Golf Club and beginning at seven o'clock the general banquet will be held at Coyle's Restaurant.

On Thursday, the last day of the convention, there will be a special technical instruction, training of drivers, and care of apparatus course given by Fred Travis, mechanical superintendent, Saint John, N. B. The final business session and election of officers will be held at 11:00 a.m.
