VESSEL DAMAGED.—The British bark G. S. Perry, from Belfast on her third trip to Charlottown, was taken up on Monday by steamers Mascot and St. Nicholas. She is leaking badly, having struck on the North Cape of P. E. Island, and also on Beanie Rock.—St. John Sun.

TOURIST TRAVEL.

Interview With Mr. H. L. Chipman, of the Plant Line.

Mr. H. L. Chipman, of Halifax, Canadian agent of the Plant Line, was interviewed by THE EXAMINER this morning. When asked about the season's business he said: "The tourist business of this season has far exceeded our expectations, and from the reports of those who visited the Island there is no doubt in my mind that it is destined in the near future to become one of the principal summer resorts of America."

"Regarding the freight business," said Mr. Chipman, "we regret that this has been far from satisfactory. But this, we understand, was from causes beyond our control and we hope that with the brighter outlook on both sides of the line, that the market will show better results with Island produce."

"The SS Halifax which has given such satisfaction during this season will make her last trip leaving Charlottown Nov. 13th. In December she will be laid up and extensive alterations will be made which will probably occupy two months or more and on the opening of navigation she will, with increased accommodation and facilities, resume the island service."

"Our Company have to thank the Island people for their generous support and the general hospitality with which they have seconded our efforts to please those of our patrons who visited the 'Garden of the Gulf.'"

BOARD OF TRADE.

As adjourned meeting of the Charlottown Board of Trade was held last evening. The President, P. Blake, Esq., occupied the chair. Among those present were noticed Hon. D. Laird, Hon. D. Farquharson, Messrs. Bulman, C. E. L. Beer, M. L. A. Beer, W. L. Cotton, T. A. McLean, W. W. Clarke, James Paton, George Stanley, George E. Hughes, H. C. McDonald, G. E. Auld, F. H. Beer, W. H. Aitken and J. Newsom.

Mr. Hazard, from the special committee appointed to obtain information concerning the proposed bridge across the Hillsborough, submitted a number of sketch plans prepared a few years ago by Mr. Brown, C. E., and reported verbally concerning the probable cost, etc., of the structure. After an interesting discussion, which was participated in by Hon. D. Laird, Hon. D. Farquharson, Messrs. J. L. Beer, Bulman, Newsom, McLean, McDonald, F. H. Beer and Cotton, it was, on motion of Mr. L. L. Beer, seconded by Mr. Paton,

"Resolved, in view of the great importance of a branch railway from Murray Harbour to Charlottown, with terminus in Charlottown, and in view of the evident expediency of having a bridge across the Hillsborough as a means of ordinary traffic, that this Board take steps to bring the matter before the Dominion and Provincial Governments, and that a special committee of five be appointed to wait upon the Minister of Marine and Fisheries and the Minister of Railways at the earliest opportunity."

The committee for this purpose was then named as follows, viz., L. L. Beer, James Paton, H. C. McDonald, M. L. A., T. A. McLean and L. E. Prowse, M. L. A., Mr. F. B. McRae was duly elected a member of the Board.

Mr. Hazard gave notice that he would, at the next meeting, propose that Mr. R. Fenell be elected a member, and Mr. T. J. Harris gave notice that he would propose Mr. W. W. Stanley.

Meeting adjourned.

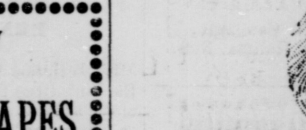
