McKINLEY WILL HURRY MATTERS.

Not Afraid of Cervera.

THINKS SPANISH ADMIRAL IS SHUT UP

And Will Probably Attempt to Do Something.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, May 28.—President McKinley, accepting, like the rest of Washington, the assurance that Cervera's fleet is effectually shut up in Santiago harbor, has directed that the invasion of Cuba shall be hastened and that arrangements be made to seize and occupy San Juan.

The plans for the capture of Cuba and Porto Rico had all been waiting for the organization of troops and the preparation of equipment and supplies, rather than for the removal of the Spanish fleet as a factor in the West India problem, but the fleet was a menace to the transportation of troops and as soon as he felt sure that it had been practically eliminated McKinley ordered an advance all along the line. The President is eager to finish his unwelcome task as quickly as possible and realizing from information sent by our Ambassadors in Europe the desperate situation of the Spanish Government, its practical inability to continue the war any longer, and its genuine desire to make peace as soon as it can satisfy the quixotic demands of Spanish honor, he received with particular pleasure the news indicating that the struggle of Spain against the inevitable could not be much longer protracted. The President has not decided yet whether the invasion of Cuba or the attack on Porto Rico would be made first, and as they cannot be made simultaneously neither can be begun until a decision is made and arrangements are going on so that either can be started first.

THE HAMMOND MURDER TRIAL.

The Prisoner Found Guilty and Sentenced.

MONTREAL, May 23.—The jury in the Hammond murder trial last night brought in a verdict of guilty.

The prisoner was sentenced to be hanged on September the 15th.

This is the third time Hammond has been tried and found guilty of the murder of his wife by poison, for the purpose of obtaining the insurance on her life.

MORE MEN FOR PHILIPPINES.

5,000 More Soldiers to Comprise the Expedition.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The War Department have chartered the steamers China and Colon, which, with the Centennial, Zealandia and Ohio, will comprise the next expedition to the Philippines, leaving some time next week.

They will carry 5,000 men.

COAL FOR SPANIARDS.

Drawn From American Coal Fields.

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.—Investigation by the secret service department indicates that Spain has been getting coal from Philadelphia. From Dec. 31, 1897, Feb. 16, 1898, no less than 57,774 tons of coal went from this port into the West Indies, or an average of 1,240 tons a day; from Feb. 16th to April 7th, fifty-two days, 62,924 tons left the port, or 1,200 tons a day. Owing to uncertainty no coal was shipped from April 7th to April 18th. Then from April 18th to May 21st, 62,076 tons were exported, or 1,300 tons a day. Since the war broke out there has been an increase of 100 tons a day sent from Philadelphia to points where Cervera plays hide-and-go seek. The number of vessels to West Indian ports has increased also. From the first of the year to the date of the Maine explosion, forty-eight days, twenty-eight vessels, all coalers, left. There have been 6,250 tons of coal sent to Fort de France, in Hayti, since April 9. What this was for is not explained by any actual need of Fort de France itself. Nassau, St. Lucia, where 3,770 tons were despatched on May 6, and where the Spanish fleet appeared on May 13. Port Antonio, Vera Cruz, and Kingston, have all lately had shipments.

TARTE ANGRY AT CRITICISMS

About His Department.

SIR CHARLES AND LADY TUPPER LEFT FOR ENGLAND.

The Opposition Leader Cheered by His Supporters.

OTTAWA, May 28.—Sir Tupper left Ottawa yesterday on his way to England accompanied by Lady Tupper.

Nearly all the opposition members went to the station to see him off, giving him three enthusiastic rounds of cheers as the train pulled out.

In the House of Commons, yesterday, upon being criticised for his method of conducting the Public Work Department, Mr. Tarte threatened that if the criticism were continued he would not stand it any longer.

So far as could be gathered from Tarte's vague threats he was giving it to understand that he would turn out all the employees of the late government on the Public Works staff unless the opposition ceased their criticism.

Mr. Foster replied to Mr. Tarte's threat by saying that if the government was mean enough to punish employees for the criticisms of the opposition he would regret it. He did not want to bring trouble upon Conservatives who remained in the public service, but if they were to suffer for his own proper criticism of the government he would not the less go on with performing his duty.

CERVERA'S ARRIVAL.

Cervera was given a great reception by the inhabitants and was banquetted.
