**CONTRACT BRIDGE**

(Top Record-Holder in Masters' Individual Championship Play)

South dealer.

**THE PLAY**  
South West North East  
1 ♠ Pass 3 ♠ Pass

Opening lead—jack of diamonds.

South won the diamond lead with the ace, took three rounds of spades and then led the king of hearts, discovering the lead heart break.

He next cleared the diamonds, cashed the ace of hearts and put East in the lead with the remaining heart, hoping that East had the king of clubs and would be compelled to lead from it. The endplay, unfortunately, did not succeed. East returned a club, as per schedule, declarer ducked, but West showed up with the setting trick, the club king.

South's valiant effort to recover was good, but not good enough. His method of play can be improved upon and, in fact, it can be carried to the extent that the contract becomes certain of achievement.

The view to be taken by South is that the hand is unbeatable if the hearts break 3-2. All plays, therefore, must be centered around the pre-emption that they will break 4-1.

After removing the adverse trumps, he should cash both high diamonds, play the king of hearts and then the ace and another club. This succession of plays is bound to render any further defense helpless.

In the actual hand, West, on lead with the club, would have to present declarer with a ruff and discard, thus eliminating the heart loser.

It would not matter, though, if East had the club king. In such case, he would have to break the heart suit. A low heart would be permitted to roll around to dummy's Q-8 to end the battle, while the jack of hearts return would also be allowed to run around to the queen and establish a sneaking situation with South's A-9 sitting over East's 10-7.

The same inevitable result would be obtained if West turned out to be the player with the king of clubs and the J-10-x-x of hearts.

What the entire situation boils down to is that the defender who has the king of clubs becomes a sitting duck as soon as he wins the club trick. Maybe it's not sporting to put your opponent in such a hopeless position, but that's life.

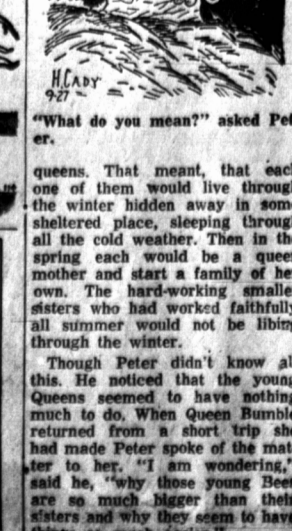
"So, you think they are lucky," said Queen Bumble. "Have you forgotten already what I told you a little while ago?"
