W.I. Training Conference Yesterday At Montague

A Women's Institute training conference for King's County was held at the Legion Hall, Montague, yesterday morning, afternoon and evening. The group attending was composed of presidents and secretaries from Institutes in King's County.

In her opening remarks at the morning session, Mrs. M. J. Doyle, North Rustico, president of the P. E. I. Women's Institute, reminded her hearers that all pleasures have responsibilities associated with them. All joined in repeating the creed, Mrs. Lorne Wigginton, Montague, was appointed chairman of the conference, and Mrs. Lincoln Dewar, New Perth, was appointed secretary.

After the introduction of discussion techniques by Miss Mary Roblin, Charlottetown, supervisor of Institutes, the conference divided into groups to discuss various questions. Miss Roblin and Mrs. Maylea Manning, assistant superintendent for King's County, led in the group and panel discussion, and Mrs. Doyle described the round table discussion. A sing-song concluded the morning session.

Mrs. Julian Herring opened the afternoon session with a very helpful description of procedure at meetings, after which the group discussed institute projects. Red Cross blood donor clinics, libraries, school improvements, hall improvements, film projection, participation in music and drama festivals, community cemetery improvement, farm forums, etc. Mrs. Murdoch MacGowan, Kilmuir, offered a number of very constructive suggestions on the preparation of Women's Institute programs.
