slight reduction in the number of dairy cows the production was up, butter, cheese and ice cream was up with butter at an all time high. In terms of whole milk he noted that there were 185,000,000 pounds produced last year, approximately 17,000,000 more than the previous year despite the fact there were several hundred fewer milk cows on the farms than in 1950.

He thought most of the increase was due to the improvement in the type of dairy cows maintained as breeders were bettering the standard. The Minister remarked that the over all cost of farming had proven an incentive to farmers to keep only high producers of milk and get rid of other animals while good price prevailed for them as beef animals.

Mr. Baker maintained that a farmer with 8 or 10 good cows on his farm was in a far better position economically, and from a labor point of view, than if he had 12 or 14 animals of lower producing capacity.

Improving Livestock

He felt that a definite factor in improving the quality of livestock was the efforts by some breeders to raise the standards of their herds. They are not doing it, he stated, to win in the show ring or even to get better prices but simply to have a better type animal on the farm. He thought, too, that the progeny from these high class registered animals would eventually make their presence felt among the grade herds and thus improve the livestock generally.

He estimated that the number of cattle in the Province last year was 98,600, an increase of 3,600 over the previous year. Mr. Baker believed that this offset the argument that farmers were in dire straits. He also spoke of the obtaining from European countries of top grade animals for service here.

The Minister of Agriculture paid tribute to the Women's Institutes for their great work in helping improve schools and remarked that with 305 branches in existence only one had dropped out of the organization last year.

He also informed the Legislature that last year there were 5,602 churning of butter analyzed, which was 79 more than in 1950 and that 7,090 boxes of cheese had been graded. He told the other members that 9,620,000 pounds of milk had been pasteurized and 795,664 pounds of ice cream manufactured.

Mr. Baker also dealt briefly with the work of the various members of his department. In reference to the work of the veterinarians of the Province he noted that since the inauguration of the Government policy in connection with the service last June the veterinarians had responded to 3,179 calls and treated 7,369 animals and 146 poultry flocks.

He paid tribute to Mr. H. W. Clay for his excellent work in improving the standard of hogs grown here to the point where they are recognized as the finest bacon type hogs in North America.

any opposition group has brought against the government involving the North Atlantic Treaty, was proposed by Percy Wright (CCF-Melort) during a continuing foreign-affairs debate.

Mr. Wright, calling economic aid to the Western European countries as important as military help in combating Russian expansion, said Canada has made only a "miserable contribution." He was critical specifically of the government's disinclination to give raw materials to the treaty countries. Other countries such as France and England had lowered their living standards by using their raw materials against Communist aggression, while Canada followed a "cash-on-the-barrelhead" policy.

Earlier, Jean Lesage, parliamentary assistant to Mr. Pearson, reported on the recent United Nations General Assembly meeting in Paris and called for continued "full support to the U.N."

Urges Pacific Pact

Howard Green (PC—Vancouver-Quadra) renewed his appeal for Canadian participation in a Pacific defence pact similar to the Atlantic Treaty. It could be a matter of life or death for Canadians on the Pacific coast.

Victor Quelch (SC—Acadia) was critical of the way the Korean U.N. intervention has operated, saying the "simple expedient of destroying a people to liberate them... cannot be justified."

Urgent Need For New High School Stressed At Montague Meeting

A special meeting was held at the Montague High School last evening to discuss and formulate plans for the possible erection of a new high school at Montague. Present at the meeting were members of the town council.

Dr. G. S. A. Inman, chairman of the planning committee, outlined the present condition of the school stating that there were approximately 280 students attending the school. There are nine rooms, occupied at the school, six on the main floor and three in the basement. Owing to overcrowding, the Legion Hall was taken care of grade eight. This overcrowding has given rise to a serious housing problem to which a solution must be found this year.

The three basement rooms have been deemed unsatisfactory, so that a minimum for present needs is a five-room department since the rooms on the main floor still remain crowded. However, Dr. Inman pointed out, this would take care of only the immediate situation, making no provision for future overcrowding and expansion.

Dr. Inman went on to explain the regional high school set up, stating that it would eventually include the incorporation of fifteen to twenty school districts whose students would be transported to Montague by bus. He cited examples of regional high schools in New Brunswick, giving a general layout of rooms and facilities. The cost of such a building would be relatively high, the government paying 50 per cent of the cost, and 25 per cent of maintenance. Each district would be assessed proportionally to defray costs and maintenance.

Alternative Plan

As an alternative the town could erect a six or eight room school to handle present needs, but which would be so designed as to lend itself to further expansion to meet growing needs. Assistance on this type of school would be \$1,000 for the first room and \$500 for each additional room. It would, owing to a proposed change in matriculation standards, also include grade twelve, which, it is expected will government for both sections of the country.

Military Defence Not Enough

In moving his non-confidence motion with the backing of his party generally, Mr. Wright said military defence under N.A.T.O. is not enough and economic aid must be an important part of the defence of free society. How could the European partners in the treaty carry out their share of military defence without raw materials?

To build a military machine at the expense of economic stability, Mr. Wright said, would be "playing directly into the hands of the enemy."

Mr. Lesage said the Paris U.N. meeting, at which he was a delegate, "let many of us with a sense of depression." But the U.N. still offered opportunities for negotiations between East and West, and it "brings together in loose association all the countries in the world which are opposed to Soviet aggression."

Mr. Quelch, while he did not indicate voting support for the non-confidence resolution of the C.O.F., said he believes defence programs have seriously undermined the economies of some European countries. He asked what steps the government plans to cushion their economies against this.

Mr. Green said Canada should make her position known on the Suez Canal, where Britain was bearing the burden of defence, and also on that of the Middle-East command.

He also suggested Mr. Pearson had indicated he had no intention of relying on the Commonwealth to guard the peace of the world and that he had little confidence in Commonwealth leadership in the world.

The Commonwealth was the greatest factor in the peace of the world, and Canada should make every effort to strengthen it.

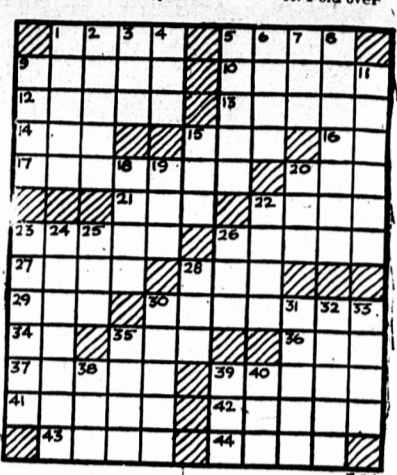
