

A despatch from the Captain-General of Barcelona, states that five Carlist officers, who all belonged to the troops once commanded by the sanguinary Tristany, together with Aguda an inkeeper, having attempted to raise the Carlist standard in the mountains of Salsona, were surprised by a detachment of the Queen's troops, and made prisoners, but having attempted to escape were all killed.—Another small Carlist band was attacked and dispersed in the mountains of Molar. One of the bandits was killed, and the rest threw away their arms, and escaped in the darkness.

ITALY.

The National Italian Committee, sitting at London, consisting of Mazzini, Saffi, and four others, has promulgated a plan for raising a loan of 10,000,000*l.*, to be subscribed, one half in sums of 100*l.* each, and one half in sums of 25*l.* The money is to be deposited in a London bank, and is to be devoted to the service of the national cause in the "inevitable struggle" which is represented to be coming. Vouchers are to be given to the subscribers, as in regular government loans; and the bonds are to bear an interest of six per cent. per annum; but the names of persons who do not wish to be known, are to be kept secret, though a note is to be taken of them to prove hereafter if necessary, their sympathy for the cause.

GERMANY.

Advices from Munich announce the departure of troops towards the Hessian frontier amid shouts of exultation of the population, and the active preparation of quarters for the Austrian troops from the Voralberg. Thirty thousand Austrians and twenty thousand Bavarians are to form an army on the Maine.

A letter from Berlin to the *Alltona Mercury* states that M. Persigny was the bearer of the communication of the adhesion of France to the recent convention between England and Russia for the pacification of the duchies.—France consents that those powers should hinder, by force if necessary, the further continuance of the war between the duchies and Denmark. The Prussian cabinet had refused to subscribe to a demand made at the same time that General Willisen and the Prussian volunteers should be recalled.

It is said that the last despatches which arrived from Berlin, have received as an ultimatum by the Austrian cabinet, and that cabinet councils have taken place, which were followed by the concentration of an army of 150,000 men. A corps of 60,000 is being concentrated in and around Vienna, and the necessary instructions have been sent to the Hungarian and Italian regiments. Some of the troops are already moving, and the army will be accompanied by 250 pieces of artillery.

All the troops at Cassel have received orders to leave that city, and that they are marching to Hanau. They will then be in a position to join the Bavarians and Austrians as soon as they enter the electorate.

INSBRUCK, Oct. 22.—The whole of Germany is being armed, and orders are everywhere issued for the troops to hold themselves ready to march, but we cannot imagine that it will result in actual war.

DENMARK AND THE DUCHIES.

Our Hamburg correspondence is of the 26th inst. It confirms the late statements of the German papers, of a cessation of hostilities, not by virtue of negotiations or treaties, but solely because the belligerent parties seem to think that an advance of either party would be without success.

United States.

Information to the 2d ult., from Santa Fe, announces the frustration of a sanguinary plot entered into by a man named Fox and several others, to rob and murder the overland party under Captain C. Hermer. The celebrated Kit Carson, to whom the infamous design was revealed after

the party left Santa Fe, started in pursuit and succeeded in arresting the villains.

Three hundred warriors of the Palon nation have gone on an expedition against the Sioux Indians. Both of these tribes are very powerful. They are inveterate enemies, and a most bloody battle or series of battles will probably be the result of this expedition of the Palos.

On Sunday evening, Right Rev. Dr. Hughes delivered a lecture in St. Patrick's Cathedral, on the decline of Protestantism. The building was crowded to excess. Not only was every seat occupied, but also every standing place in the aisles. As fifty cents were charged for admission, the sum taken at the door could not be under \$1,500. The lecture was marked with all that ingenuity of logic—that mathematical precision of argument, for which the Right Rev. Bishop is so distinguished.
