I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace. Where never lark, or even eagle flew:

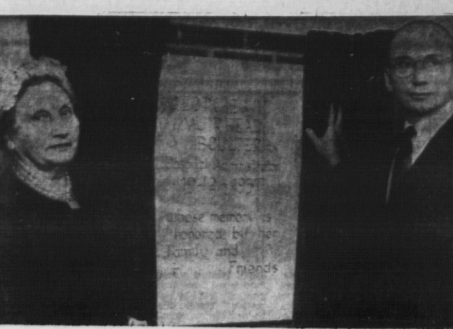
And while with silent, lifting mind, I've trod the high untrampled sanctity of space, I've been a hand and touch of the face of God."

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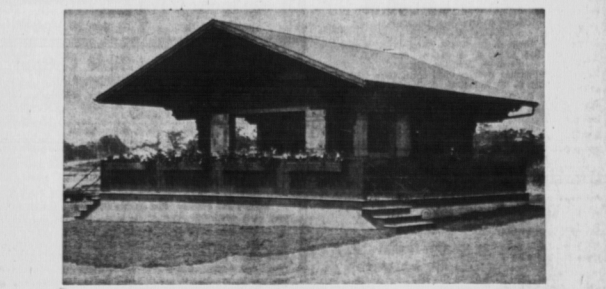
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
