ANOTHER ENGLISHMAN DISAPPEARS.—It is stated that a young Englishman named Thomas Veitch, left Fenelon Township, Ontario, nearly a year ago for Australia, via San Francisco. His mother in England has written to friends in Fenelon asking as to his whereabouts. Inquiry shows that he never sailed from San Francisco and fears are entertained that he has met with foul play.

HORSES AND SHEEP.—The Pioneer says: Five horses were shipped on board the St. Lawrence on Saturday morning, and the morning previous seven were sent away, six of which were sent to the West Indies via St. John. The other was Mr. James Tuplin's Futurity colt inspector, which was sold to Conductor Brownell of the Intercolonial Railway for a pretty big figure. On Saturday Mr. McGrath sent away 202 lambs for the United States.

SCHOONER WRECKED.—The schooner Mary Jane, owned by Thomas Button, of Wallace, N. S., in ballast, was wrecked off Cape Tormentine last night. She was seen from the shore, and a party of rescuers tried to reach her in one of the ice-boats but failed to do so. However, they got out to her this morning, and found one man on the wreck, but he was dead. In his pocket was a card on which were the words, "Franklin Simmonds, Wallace, N. S." The schooner was formerly owned by Capt. Thistle, of Souris, and was about 55 tons register. She was sold to Capt. Button last spring. All hands were lost. Two bodies were washed ashore this morning, but they have not yet been identified.

Trouble in a Church.

TORONTO, Oct. 6.

The actions of Vicar-General Rooney at yesterday's service in St. Mary's Church, caused considerable hostile comment among the congregation. Last Sunday week the Vicar-General announced that there would be a special collection on the Sunday following, for the education of Canadians for the priesthood. Yesterday at both masses he told the congregation that he did not want their five and ten cent pieces, they could keep them, when two or three persons started to leave the church. He ordered the doors to be locked until the collection was taken up, and even followed the collectors around to watch that each one contributed. Quite a number who had come prepared to put a quarter or a fifty cent piece into the plate, got so indignant that they refused to contribute anything.

Irish Affairs.

DUBLIN, Oct. 6.

A conference of Irish Nationalists, called by Parnell, was held to-day. Part of the business of the conference was the selection of a deputation to visit America for the purpose of laying before the people a plain statement of the situation of affairs in Ireland. John Dillon, William O'Brien, Thomas Power O'Connor, Timothy Sullivan and Abraham Gill were appointed to form the deputation.

One hundred Hussars and 350 extra policemen have arrived at Clonmel. It is believed that their presence is due to the fears of the Government that a collision may occur between the Berkshire and Eighteenth Regiments, both of which are quartered in the town.

Obituary.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6.

Hon. Lawrence Clark, chief factor of the Hudson Bay Co. and a prominent man in the Northwest Territories, died this morning at Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, where his headquarters are. Mr. Clark will be remembered in the east through his connection with the Reil uprising, the half breeds blaming him for precipitating the action at Daak Lake by using threatening language towards Reil and some of his friends.

LONDON, Oct. 6.

The wife of General Booth, Commander-in-Chief of the Salvation Army, died to-day.

Arrested on Suspicion.

MONCTON, Oct. 6.

Gardiner and Burrows, the tramps arrested on Saturday on suspicion of being concerned in the train wrecking near Anagance last Monday were brought before Stipendiary Wortman to-day and examined separately. They denied being near the scene of the wreck on the day in question. They have not yet been identified, but have been remanded awaiting the evidence of trainmen and others.

The Mormon Conference.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Oct. 6.

The General Conference of the Church of the Latter Day Saints this morning unanimously adopted a manifesto forbidding in future marriages in violation of the laws of the land. It re-adopted the original articles of faith, among which is this: "We believe in being subject to kings, presidents, rulers and magistrates, and in obeying, honoring and sustaining the law."

Snow in New Brunswick.

About two inches of snow fell at Newcastle to-day, also a flurry at Goggins, Albert County, and a slight flurry in Moncton.

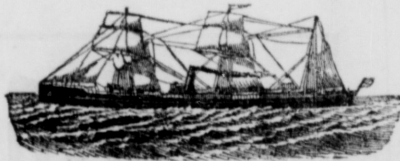
PHILHARMONIC.—There will be a meeting of the Philharmonic Society this evening, when practice will be commenced on Mendelssohn's Hymn of Praise.

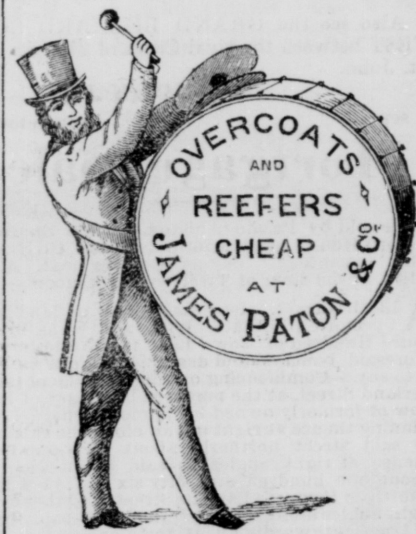
