SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.

Bills to incorporate the Inverness Railway Company and Louisburg and Richmond Railway Company were introduced and read a first time.

On motion of Sir John Macdonald Thursdays were appropriated as Government days after this week. The Government bills amending the patent trade marks and copy rights act were read a second time and adopted in committee. House again went into committee on Sir John Thompson's bill relating to bills of exchange, cheques and promissory notes, and strong exception was taken to the proposition to relieve the banks from the responsibility for the payment of cheques payable to order, and on which the payer's endorsement is forged. Sir John Thompson finally reserved the clause for further consideration.

An Embezzler in the Toils.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 25.

Walton, the embezzler, is still in charge of the police authorities here, and the efforts of the Montreal men to secure him have been ineffectual. Detective Carpenter arrived from Montreal this afternoon, with a warrant for the arrest of Walton, and it was endorsed by Police Magistrate Ritchie. Carpenter presented it to Chief of Police Marshall and the latter took charge of the document, and after lengthy consultation with legal gentlemen refused to recognize it, inasmuch as he had been previously served with a writ of habeas corpus, calling upon him to bring the prisoner before Judge Palmer to-morrow morning at eleven o'clock. The Montreal men are very indignant at this proceeding.

"The Modus Vivendi"

LONDON, Feb. 25.

In the British House of Commons yesterday, Gourley, Liberal member for Sunderland, asked whether the government intended to recommend Canada to extend the modus vivendi, arranged for in the treaty negotiated by Joseph Chamberlain at Washington, until the treaty of 1818 was finally interpreted.

Sir James Ferguson, Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, stated that the modus vivendi could only be revived by Canada, which proposed to consider the question during the present session of the Dominion Parliament.

Siberian Prisoners.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 25.

The Government has taken a step toward alleviating the condition of prisoners. It has purchased a steamer to convey the prisoners on their way to Siberia, down the Volga, instead of sending them in old barges which made the voyage a terrible cruelty. It is reported that the Czar will make a tour in Siberia next summer.

Parliamentary News.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.

It is understood that the budget speech will not be delivered for at least a fortnight. It is probable that the day selected will either be the 11th or the 14th of March.

Home Rule.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

Delegates representing those in favor of Home Rule for Scotland and delegates representing the Liberals of South Wales had a conference in this city to-day and agreed to co-operate to obtain Home Rule for Scotland and Wales, subject to supremacy of the Imperial Parliament.
