***CASE ADJUDGED.** Russell Brown, Dingwells Mills appeared before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, Q.C. in the Court House at Georgetown yesterday and was further remanded in custody, and his case adjourned to Wednesday January 21st at 2 p.m. at Georgetown. No evidence was taken. Brown is charged with intent to do grievous bodily harm, did unlawfully wound Allan Blaisdell contrary to Section 237 of the Criminal Code of Canada. The incident took place at Dingwells Mills on January 4th, and Brown has been in custody since that date.
