TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27. It is rumored that the resignation of Earl Cowper as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is impending.

Six arrests were made to-day under the Coercion Act, including that of the President of the Kilkenny Branch of the Land League.

The suspects in Galway jail passed a resolution approving of the no rent manifesto.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 26. The Cotton Exposition formally opened at 2 o'clock to-day. One feature of the day was the making of two suits of clothes, one for Gov. Colquitt, of Georgia, and one for Gov. Bigelow, of Connecticut, from seed cotton, picked at seven o'clock this morning. The suits were worn at the reception this evening.

BERLIN, Oct. 27. The coronation of the Czar will take place in April.

VIENNA, Oct. 27. King Humbert and Queen Margareta arrived to-night.

LONDON, Oct. 27. The death is announced of Mr. Nathaniel Massey, Member of Parliament, aged sixty-two.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. Judge Charles J. Folger, of New York, has been confirmed for Secretary of the Treasury, Governor Morgan having declined the position.

Frank Shatten, of Iowa, was also confirmed for First Assistant Postmaster General. Silas S. S. Hubell, of New York, was nominated for Consul at St. John's, Quebec.

MARSEILLES, Oct. 27. Sick soldiers continue to arrive from North Africa. The military hospital is more than filled, and orders have been given to prepare the Avignon Hospital.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Oct. 27. The schr. Erastus Wiman, Capt. Anderson, of New York, ran into and sank the schr. P. M. Whiten, Capt. Hallock, of Huntington, near Gulliskind, last night. Capt. Hallock was drowned.

LONDON, Oct. 29. The natives are fighting on the northwest and southwest frontiers of the Transvaal. The Transvaal has proclaimed neutrality on its part.

DUBLIN, Oct. 27. The Land Court yesterday disposed of 22 pro forma applications.

The League Solicitor mentioned the test cases. He said all remaining on the list were his, about fifty, but he feared the information was insufficient. The cases were then gone into and fourteen considered.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27. Hon. Mr. Mackenzie and Sir Alexander Campbell, having declined the appointment as Trustees of the Canada Pacific Railway land bonds, Messrs. Smithers and Thorne, of New York, and Hon. John Hamilton, have been appointed such Trustees.

Sir A. T. Galt is said to have very little hopes of securing a Commercial Treaty with France.

Mr. Fraser, Commissioner of Public Works of Ontario, has gone to New York for medical advice.

DUBLIN, Oct. 26. A box containing several thousand pounds worth of checks and notes was stolen from a messenger of the National bank to-day while he was signing a receipt in the post office.

The Local Government board has dismissed Dr. Kenny from the post of parochial medical officer.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24. Denny Lyons and Frank McGowan, New York "bruisers," fought a prize fight near Westhewken, N. J., yesterday. Both men were terribly punished, and this afternoon Lyons is reported to be dying.

DETROIT, Oct. 25. The Anchor Line steamer Clarion was wrecked on the rocks at Limekiln Crossing this morning, and now lies in eighteen feet of water. Crew saved.

Weather Bulletin. Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the Maritime Provinces. TORONTO, October 28—10 a. m. Moderate winds, and fine weather.

On Tuesday the postponed Somerset Races were held at the Somerset Driving Park. The attendance was small, there being not above a hundred present. The races, too, were not so exciting as many expected, but this is no more than what might have been looked for, owing to the disadvantages Mr. O'Ronahau had in the weather. In the two year old race there were four entries, two of which were "Abdallah" colts and two "All Rights," the speed and beauty of the latter being much admired. Mr. Newton Lee's "St. Julien" came in first and Mr. Henry Clark's "Lightfoot" second, with the "Abdallahs" bringing up the rear. The running race was won by Mr. Patrick Keeffe's mare. As to the order on the grounds, it was truly a miniature Donnybrook Fair. Everyone trying to make himself as hilarious as possible. One man was severely hurt by being thrown from his wagon while returning from the grounds, and other minor accidents are reported. —Journal.

LAUNCH.—There was launched on Tuesday, at Summerside, a magnificent three masted schooner for Hon. Wm. Richards, Bideford. She is a vessel of 600 tons, and has been built under the owner's special supervision. A little difficulty was experienced at first in getting her started on the launch-way, but once in motion, she glided most majestically into her future element, and was safely moored at Queen's wharf, a few hours afterwards. This handsome vessel certainly reflects great credit upon her builder, Mr. John Ramsay, and she is the first schooner built here that has been fitted with iron masts. She is to load with cargo for England, and is expected to be ready to sail in about three weeks. Her dimensions are: length over all 165 feet, breadth 28 1/2 feet and depth of hold 17 1/2 feet. —Journal.
