In the Winnipeg markets, beef is quoted at 15 to 20c; pork, 16 to 20c; mutton, 16 to 25c; lamb, 20 to 25c; venison, 30 to 40c; chickens (per lb.) 30c; ducks (per lb.), 35 to 60c; prairie chickens (per pair) 50 to 75c; rabbits, 25c each. Butter is 30 to 32c per lb; eggs, 30 to 35c per dozen, and potatoes 85c to \$1 per bushel. Wheat is quoted at 83c and oats 50 to 55c. Wood rates at \$8 to \$10 per cord, and hay at from \$12 to \$15 per ton. Oysters are retailed at 55 to 75c per can—the latter being from New York.

A GALE of wind blew from the south-east on Wednesday for four or five hours. It was followed by another from the same direction on Thursday at 9 o'clock. Veering to the south-west and then to the west it blew a regular hurricane, which lasted until to-day at noon, when it commenced to moderate. It was accompanied by a cold snap. The thermometer last night registered six below zero and this morning at 8 o'clock it fell to nine and one half. It has become more moderate. But the probabilities are that the temperature will be lower. The river here is bordered with ice to the channel. Summerside and Shediac harbors are closed, and shippers who have vessels in Charlottetown harbor are in dread of its early close.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Great Fire in London. LONDON, Dec. 9. A heavy fire broke out yesterday in the great warehouses of Wood, Phillips, Adde and Loudon, situated on Wall Street. They were mostly destroyed with the contents. The loss is estimated at over three millions pounds sterling.

France's Interest in Egypt. PARIS, Dec. 9. The *Republique Francaise*, a leading journal, in an article on Egyptian control, threatens that France will protect her own interests in Egypt if England continues her present policy, which is hostile to France.

Gladstone's Reported Retirement. LONDON, Dec. 9. The *Times* editorially states that Lord Derby, Minister of Foreign Affairs in the Disraeli Cabinet, and Sir Charles Dilke, Under Foreign Secretary, will enter the Cabinet after Christmas. It also states that Mr. Gladstone will resign next session, and the Marquis of Huntingdon will assume the Premiership.
