ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

The annual meeting of St. James' Church was held last evening, Mr. John McPherson in the chair.

Reports presented by the various organizations connected with the congregation showed steady progress in all directions.

The congregation learned with great satisfaction that the repairs and alterations in the church edifice, which have made St. James' Church one of the most beautiful as well as most comfortable churches in the province, were so efficiently managed by the trustees that the expenditure was kept within the amount received from the insurance for damages by the fire. The hearty thanks of the congregation were tendered to the Board for this gratifying result.

A pleasing feature of the meeting was the acknowledgment by the congregation, with devout gratitude to God, of the generous liberality of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald Kennedy to the missions of the church. The retiring trustees, Messrs Lord, Small and Gordon, were re-elected and Mr. James Tait was chosen to replace Mr. Duncan McLean.

Cordial and hearty votes of thanks were passed to the Ladies Aid Society, the officers and members of the Young Men's Literary Association, the ladies and gentlemen of the choir, and the Supt, officers and teachers of the Sabbath School for their valuable and efficient services during the year. The admiral manner in which the chairman and secretary of the meeting (Mr. D. R. McLennan) performed their duties was also suitably acknowledged.

Financially the year has been perhaps the most prosperous in the history of the congregation. Apart altogether from the repairs of the church the receipts of the various organizations were as follows:

LONDON FAIR

A Splendid Success in St. Peter's Hall Yesterday Afternoon and Evening.

The committee of ladies in charge, all who assisted at the London Fair, held in St. Peter's Hall yesterday afternoon and evening are to be congratulated on the success which attended their efforts. The hall was well filled both afternoon and evening. A whole day might have been profitably spent in examining the large and exceedingly interesting collection of rarities and curiosities. Among the collection were very old book-fancy work (chins, legal documents, collection of coins, old bank notes, butterflies, etc.), curiosities collected at the Crimea and numberless interesting relics, many of them upwards of one hundred years old and some dating as far as 1400 B. C. The Art Gallery was very amusing and exceptionally well thought out. The animals in the Zoo attracted much attention, especially the young folk. These (the animals) included a monkey, two parrots, guinea pigs, rabbits pigeons, etc. Also a number of stuffed animals, birds and fish. Tea was served at six o'clock. The candy and fancy tables were well patronized. During the evening a programme of songs, readings and instrumental music helped to make the time more enjoyable, and was much appreciated.
