LATEST TELEGRAPH DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER OFFICE.

St. Jons, April 22d, 1867.—Napoleon signified his willingness to accept propositions submitted by Great Powers. Prussia, however, has not replied. Gladstone has written a letter, virtually resigning leadership of the Liberal party. . . . Gold 137½.

St. Jons, N. B., April 23, 1867.—London, 22d.—Spain promises England full satisfaction and indemnity for seizure of Victoria; but reply to demand in case of Tornado continues evasive and unsatisfactory. . . . Gold 138½.

St. Jons, April 24, 1867.—London, 22d.—Peace between France and Prussia almost despaired of.—Prussians arming for expected shock of arms. Warlike aspect caused considerable alarm in London Stock Exchange, tendency of affairs towards financial panic. . . . Gold 138½. "S. S. Cuba" arrived at Halifax, 3.30 p. m., yesterday.

FROM COLONIAL EXCHANGES.

LONDON, April 12.—The steamer which sailed for Cadiz early this week, took out the peremptory demand made by the British Government upon Spain, for instant redress in both the cases of the *Tornado* and the *Victoria*. To this summons the Spanish Government has made a vague reply in regard to the *Tornado*, but has given no answer whatever to the claim made in the case of the *Victoria*.

LONDON, April 12.—The midnight debate on the Reform Bill occurred in the House of Commons this evening. Mr. Gladstone offered an amendment to the bill fixing the rating at £50. A long and interesting debate on the amendment was followed by a decided vote for the Government, the majority in their favor being 21.

LONDON, April 13, noon.—The *Times* of this morning has a congratulatory editorial on the defeat of the Liberals on the Reform Bill in the House of Commons last evening. The course pursued by Mr. Gladstone is favorably commented on, while that of the Liberal members who deserted their party is equally lauded. The *Times* thinks the Liberal bolters hold the balance of power now, and virtually control the Reform Bill.

FLORENCE, April 16.—The protracted investigation into the conduct of Admiral Persano, who commanded the Italian fleet at the battle of *Lisa*, has been concluded. In accordance with the verdict of the court martial he has been sentenced to be cashiered from the naval service for incapacity and disobedience.

We notice in the *Summerside Journal* the recent death of a young man, at *Centreville*, *Be-deque*—Mr. Henry Maxfield. The death of this man was the effect of the bursting of a gun. That numbers of goose-shooters are not annually killed or maimed by the bursting of guns, is a matter of surprise. Hundreds of people in this Island are in the habit of using old or worthless guns, which are not safe when loaded with an ordinary charge of powder. Into these guns are usually poured quantities of shot, which no prudent man would put into a gun of the best description. The effects are very often the bursting of the gun, but fortunately the consequences are seldom of a very serious character. All who value their lives should be careful not to use defective guns, and never to over-load any gun. It is quite a mistake to suppose that a gun's efficiency is increased in proportion to the charge of powder employed. Attention to this is calculated to prevent accidents, such as that which cost poor Maxfield his life.—*Isl.*

WILD GOOSE SHOOTING EXTRAORDINARY.
—Wild Geese have been unusually numerous around this Island, for the past few weeks. Some thousands must have been shot by our Island sportsmen. We are informed that Messrs B. Beavie and Peter McNutt shot two hundred in Richmond Bay—forty-five in one day. An Indian party, and another forty, in the same Bay. Judge Peters and son, at Savage Harbor, fifty. We have heard of several Indians killing thirty and forty.—*Isl.*

Ship News.

The Steamer "Alhambra," from Boston and Halifax, arrived here on Monday evening last; she encountered considerable ice in the Gulf, which detained her some twenty-five hours behind her time. The "Alhambra" sailed again on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

The Steamer "Heather Belle" made her first trip for the season to Pictou on Wednesday, and returned to this port again on Thursday morning with an English Mail, by the Steamer "Cuba," at Halifax on the 23rd. The "Heather Belle" reports large quantities of ice in the Bay and Straits.

The Steamer "Princess of Wales" left this Port for Pictou, yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, being her first departure for the season. Both the Steamers have been thoroughly overhauled, painted, &c. &c. and are now in tip-top condition for the summer's work.

TENDERS

for Steam Communication between Souris, Georgetown, Murray Harbor and Pictou.

TENDERS are required to be sent into the Colonial Secretary's Office on or before THURSDAY, the 6th day of MAY next, at Two o'clock in the afternoon, by any Person or Company who may be willing to contract to run a STEAMER once or twice a week for the conveyance of Passengers and Freight, and Mails, if required, between Souris, Georgetown, Murray Harbor, and Pictou, touching at each Port going and returning, so long as the Navigation shall remain open, from the FIRST day of JUNE next, to the close of the season of 1867, and during the open season in the two following years, 1868 and 1869.
