On two charges, Donald Louis Brehaut, Sherwood, counselled by Lester O'Donnell, was remanded until June 3 for arraignment, with bail to stand.

On one count, he is charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, and on the other with assaulting a police officer. Capt. W.S. Finest, RCMP, while the latter was performing his lawful duties.

Peering guilty to the possession at Seaview of 20 undersized lobsters, James Ralph MacKay, Summerside, was fined \$15 and costs or five days in jail.

At the request of counsel, John P. Nicholson, the case of Arthur Edward Holland, Charlottetown, charged with driving without due care and attention was adjourned until May 31 to fix a date for hearing.

Of four persons charged with the possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences, two were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail. The other two had their cases adjourned, one until June 8 and the other until June 7.

In the first adjourned case defence counsel is Charles R. McQuaid and in the second Alphon M. Gillis.

Four Fined Following Fight At North Rustico

Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon.

Gallant was charged with creating a disturbance at the Royal Canadian Legion Home, North Rustico, by fighting.

Bernard MacNeill, Rustico, a member of the legion executive, testified that on the night of May 18, he had seen the accused fighting in the porch of the home with Alfred Gauthier. He had separated the two and taken the accused outside.

He said that when he next saw the accused, outside the building, he was standing over a man lying on the ground. The witness said that he had asked another man to assist him in lifting the man off the ground and putting him into his car.

While in the act of lifting the man, Mr. MacNeill said the accused had struck the man who was helping him, in the face with his fist breaking the latter's false teeth in three pieces.

He also testified that he had seen Gallant fighting with two other persons, Edward Buote and Harvey Gauthier. He estimated that the three fights the accused was engaged in outside the building took place within a space of 20 to 30 minutes.

Mr. MacNeill stated that the accused had been drinking.
