Terror Tactics From Jail Cell

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—An illiterate truck firm owner accused of using dynamite, arson and terror in his business has been charged with continuing the tactics against prosecution witnesses from his jail cell.
Jesse Wilson, 49, owner of Tennessee Motor Lines, was accused Monday of arranging bond for a former employee he met in the jail and hiring him to kill the state's three chief witnesses in the cases against him.
District Attorney J. Carlton Loser, who called the case "the most fantastic thing" he had ever encountered, said the man hired as the killer, whose name was withheld, turned out to be a friend of Carl Stokes, 40-year-old former mechanic with the truck firm and a key state witness against Wilson. The man telephoned a warning to Stokes and later agreed to co-operate with police in the case. Mrs. Pauline Foster Kelley, Wilson's 46-year-old secretary, paid \$1,000 to the man hired to do the killing and arranged his bail. She also has been charged with conspiracy to murder.

FORMOSA HAS BLACKOUT
TAIPEH, Formosa (AP)—An unidentified plane heading toward Formosa from the northwest caused a 55-minute island-wide blackout shortly before midnight Tuesday, the Chinese Nationalist defence ministry said. No air raid warning was sounded. Nationalist officials have voiced increasing fears of Communist air attacks since the fighting over Quemoy began Sept. 3.

Colored Pictures At Irishtown Hall

—With the aid of colored views and informative commentary, a large audience at Irishtown hall on September 28, accompanied by Lieut. Col. E. W. Johnstone on a review of a trip including many old world scenes.
The first of the photos was taken on the S. S. Scythia, on which the party, composed of Col. and Mrs. Johnstone, their daughter Elizabeth, and Mr. and Mrs. Louis Muttart embarked on a three month tour of England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Switzerland, France, Holland, Germany, Austria, Italy and Yugoslavia, and concluded with scenes on the Franconia, returning to Canada, and view taken from Woodlough, the Johnstone home at Burlington, which persons in the audience were heard to say, were as beautiful as any.
In many of the scenes, interest was added by the inclusion of members of the party. While sightseeing in Hyde Park, the speaker said he was surprised when a lady greeted him by name, and he discovered them to be the Misses Wyatt of Summerside.
A small section of a street in Cambridge was shown in which stands the house known as "Little Kensington", where Joe Beatty, who is buried outside the city, and Kensington boys who came back, had made their "home away from home" during World War 2. Also of special interest to the local audience were views in a Canadian cemetery in France, of the graves of Col. Johnstone's brother, Arthur, and Clinton Glydon of Margate who gave their lives in World War 1.
Excellent views of the Vimy Memorial built on soil given to Canada by the Government of France, were seen, as well as surrounding country, which the speaker said, had changed so much that he would never recognize it as the battleground where he had fought with the Canadian Army in World War 1.
Other scenes included beautiful gardens and parks, a Canadian cemetery in France where a red rose grows on every grave churches and cathedrals, castles and historic homes, colleges and country estates.
Disappointing to the party was the fact that Glamis Castle, the original of the famous replica built by Col. Johnstone, had not been opened to the public at the time of their visit and two photos of Churchill, of which much was expected, turned out to be failures.
Mr. Leigh Paynter presided and thanked Col. Johnstone for an instructive and interesting evening. Irishtown's well singing stars, Lois and Leta MacLeod, who never fail to delight their audience, were heard in two selections, prior to the lecture.—Bur.

Flight Nurse at Irishtown Hall
