(Continued from page 5) nal, and probably another at McInnis' old dam at the head of B.2 Pond, on the Seven Mile Road, east of Souris.

It is interesting to note that the first by-pass built in the Province has been in operation for about fourteen years, at Dingwell's old dam, on the Souris Highway. It is now being proposed that many road bridges could be eliminated, if the Dingwell mill plan was followed. Two purposes could be served if the Provincial Government fell in with the proposal.

Benefit number one would be improved fishing, and second, the creation of small lakes throughout the countryside would do much in the way of beautification. There is always the possibility that Provincial engineers may turn thumbs down on such by-passes as not being practical. Contained bodies of water, which become swollen in spring time can wreak havoc, if located in the vicinity of highways. If the Dingwell Mill's plan is tried elsewhere the engineers would have to be very sure that the highway concerned would not be in danger of flooding from time to time.

The pond referred to as Jordan's Pond at Bristol is jointly owned by Mr. Jordan, Mr. Gordon Hughes, former owner of the Hughes Drug Company in Charlottetown, and Mr. Norman MacLeod, retired Provincial Government official.

Mr. E. M. Phillips (Bus) has had his contract for the rebuilding of the wharf in Naufrage extended. It was found after the original work had been started that the east side of the "run" was in much worse shape than expected. After inspection by the engineers the additional work was approved by Ottawa. This extension of repairs will provide work until late in the autumn, for a considerable number of residents of the district.

Though guns and ammunition have soared in price like every other marketable commodity (including newspapers), gunners will be out in force for the opening of the duck season on Monday. All week long Charlottetown hunters have been making ready for the big day, and the marshes and ponds will be well populated

when water temperatures are low. Dr. Needer said that he would give the full results of his findings at the forthcoming hearing.

In a preliminary discussion of marketing problems, Mr. MacNaught gave per capita figures on fish consumption in Prince Edward Island. In comparison with the remainder of Canada the figures showed that the Island was the third lowest Province with a consumption of slightly less than eight pounds per year. Of this figure canned fish accounted for 4.62 pounds, fresh fish 1.42, smoked and cured fish .35 and shell 1.52.

Mr. MacNaught observed that this figure could be doubled without interfering with any other food producing industry, by improved marketing and distribution methods.

Low Fish Consumption

It was emphasized by the chairman that while no doubt the figures do reflect the trend, in a largely rural area they are somewhat harder to get than in an urban district, where larger catering establishments play a big part in increased fish consumption. Making due allowance for these facts, there is a deficiency in the handling and distribution of fish in the Province.

The abundance of good agricultural products in the Province was also mentioned as a contributory reason for the low fish consumption, and the need for improvement of inspection and controls to eliminate the poorer practises, along the lines adopted by the Department of Agriculture were suggested.

The lack of established channels to conduct a survey of per capita consumption here particularly as no record is kept by many fishermen who sell to the fish peddlers, stated Mr. Gorman, made him believe that we are not as disloyal to the industry as the figures would suggest. The question of the drift-netting of salmon and the marketing of fresh salmon, he said, would be a stimulous to the trade, and a discussion along those lines could be profitably held at some future date.
