Bruins Beat Leafs To Run Winning Streak To Nine

BOSTON (AP)—The surging Boston Bruins maintained their National Hockey League lead and extended their unbeaten streak to nine games by outbattling the Toronto Maple Leafs for a 4-3 victory Sunday night.

Cal Gardner, a veteran club player, scored what proved to be the winning goal in the third period when he whacked in a rebound on a shot by Doug Mohns.

Defenceman Ron Stewart, a converted forward, sent the Maple Leafs into a 1-0 lead by blasting home a shot by George Armstrong in the final minute of the opening period while Boston was short-handed.

Real Chevrefils tied the count with an unassisted tally at 1:54 of the second period, and Don McKenney and Vic Stasiuk added two more for the Bruins. Stewart then scored his second goal again when Boston had a player in the penalty box, and Sid Smith tipped in a long shot by Gerry Jaes.

The Bruins have lost only one of their last 13 starts. They had a seven-game winning string going until they were tied by the Rangers in New York Saturday.

Saints Nip St. Mary's 47-45 In Basketball Tilt Saturday

St. Dunstan's University basketball team made its first home stand of the season a successful one Saturday night at their gym by defeating St. Mary's University 47-45 in a close hard fought exhibition tilt.

John (Hondo) Kelly's field goal with less than a minute of play remaining in the game made the difference and the Saints managed to obtain possession of the ball in the last 47 seconds of the game and "freeze" it effectively.

Kelly teamed up with captain Bob Fearon to lead the S.D.U. scorers with 14 points each. Kelly hit on seven occasions for field goals while Fearon was deadly in the free-throw department making good on 10 of eleven tries. Fearon swished in four points on field goals.

It was in the free-throw department that the Santamarians failed badly scoring on 11 of 22 attempts. The Saints did much better hitting on 13 of 19 tries. St. Mary's led 30-28 at halftime but were outscored 19 to 15 in the second section.

The game was a close, tight tussle throughout and at various points was tied no less than 17 times.

Lanky Don Clarke was high scorer for St. Mary's with 12 points. Ross followed with 11 and Dunsforth had 9.

Chick Morrison had 7 for S.D.U. and Lorne MacGuigan and Brian Noonan had 6 apiece.

S.D.U. lost Pete McGonnell in the first half via the five-foul rule and Clarke left the game late in the second half for the same reason.

Detroit Swamps Canadiens 8-3

DETROIT (CP)—Veteran Ted Lindsay included the 300th goal of his National Hockey League career in a three-goal assault Sunday night in leading Detroit Red Wings to the most lopsided victory of the current season, an 8-3 spree against Montreal's defending champion Canadiens.

Lindsay's goals were the third, sixth and eighth for Detroit in the game which saw the Wings take a 3-2 lead in the first period and then stage a runaway. It offset the 6-2 defeat Saturday night in Montreal.

Lindsay's middle counter was the 300th for the scrappy veteran of 13 years in the NHL. He became the fourth player in NHL history to pass that milestone. Nels Stewart first to do it, stopped at 324 when he retired. Montreal's Rocket Richard now has reached 467. Detroit's Gordie Howe has 318.

Howe also got a pair in Sunday night's game while Billy McNeill, Dutch Reibel and Red Kelly added singles. M. Richard, Claude Provost and Jean Beliveau hit for the Canadiens.

With his spree, which also included two assists, Lindsay pulled into a tie with Beliveau for the NHL point leadership with 22 each.

Wings remained in second place two points behind Boston but widened their lead over third-place Montreal to three points.

The ex-Ranger's tally culminated an uphill battle for the Hawks, who trailed 2-0 at the end of the first period of the riotous affair.

Things became so wild in the final frame that fans began hurling chairs at the Ranger players as they left for their dressing room after the final whistle.

Police and ushers quickly broke up one duel, in which New York's Lou Fontinato was slashing his stick at the fans as they threw the chairs.

The tie kept fifth-place New York three points ahead of the last-place Hawks. It was the Rangers' second consecutive deadlock and the Hawks' second game without a loss.

New York's scorers in the first frame were George (Red) Sullivan and Gerry Foley.

Ed Litzemberger picked up his eighth goal of the season for Chicago in the second frame.

Four Football Titles Decided In Canada Over Weekend

Almost overshadowed by the Grey Cup semi-finals at Montreal and Edmonton, four other football championships, including two national titles, were settled in eastern Canada during the weekend.

At Kitchener the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen overcame their injuries and played like the championship squad of old to overcome London-Lords 27-14 and retain their Ontario Rugby Football Union senior crown.

At Kingston, Little Ron Stewart, a dare-devil running halfback, made one big play and kicker Jocko Thompson supplied the finishing touch as Queen's University Golden Gaels edged University of Toronto Blues 4-2 on a last-minute field goal to hang onto their senior intercollegiate championship.

Winnipeg Rods struck through the air to win their second straight Canadian junior title with a 21-10 conquest of Parkdale Lions at Toronto.

And on a muddy field at Fort William, Ont., Hamilton Tiger-Cats overcame a 4-0 first-quarter deficit to defeat Fort William Redskins 20-5 for the Dominion junior championship.

With the greasy surface hampering running plays and making passing difficult, Tiger-Cats rebounded with a touchdown in the second quarter and two more in the final.

Dutchmen won their game along the line where they came up with a superb effort to hold London to a net gain of only 37 yards. The Dutchmen, on the other hand, made 819 yards running.
