Georgetown Theatre Play Is Successful.

The Kings Theatre, Georgetown, proved to be a conversation piece with its production of "Under the Yum Yum Tree" on Friday and Saturday nights.

The producer, Beth McGowan, and set designer, Pierre Delanoë, overcame the difficulty of using a small stage which is very close to the audience, although players and audience needed the first few minutes of the play to become accustomed to this closeness.

This very modern comedy is set in a San Francisco apartment, complete with foghorns in the distance, which may partially account for the slight chill in the theatre on Saturday night. Four confused, neurotic and sincere people manage to resolve their respective problems in the course of two entertaining hours, and everyone lives happily ever after.

The apartment belongs to a brave, brittle divorcee played by Tudi Wiggins. Miss Wiggins' characterization was consistently good, although she was playing an inconsistent character and had to be confused, neurotic and sincere in varying degrees.

Sub-letting the apartment for the summer was Robin Austin, a newly-graduated lab technician. Anne Butler played this major role with warmth and energy. Her part was demanding and she showed an ability to connect the action of the play and keep it moving.

Marc Strange played opposite Miss Butler as Dave Manning, attorney-fiancé of Robin Austin. This character was neither confused nor neurotic, but very sincere and Mr. Strange gave an excellent performance although he was a little unconvincing when angry. His position as a promising young attorney would also warrant polishing his shoes.

If "Under the Yum Yum Tree" is considered a comedy, then the landlord, played by Walter Massey, is neither confused, nor sincere, but definitely neurotic. He is a self-describ-

OXFORD, England (AP)—Statistics showing young Englishmen will greatly outnumber young women in the next 40 years prompted an instructor to suggest this weekend that women be allowed more than one husband.

Ian McLuckie, a lecturer at the Hatfield College of Technology, told a conference of welfare workers that by the year 2000, Britain will need to consider polyandry.

Lawyer Plans Walking Trip

PHOENIX (AP)—Young Sid Rosen is quitting after two years as assistant attorney general of Arizona to walk around the world.

"There is more to living than having a profession," he says. "I want to see things, the people, how they live—and find out what they really think of America, the (Viet Nam) war and other things."

A bachelor, Rosen, 27, will leave in August. He will go alone, spending "about \$1,000," he figures, for boat or motor travel in places where hiking is impossible.

Otherwise, he plans to cross first the South Pacific islands of Tahiti, Samoa and Fiji. Then, across New Zealand, Australia, a dozen tiny islands, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Formosa, Japan, Korea and Singapore.

From Singapore to Paris, Rosen has outlined a route to be made entirely on foot. He wants to hike to Cairo, Egypt, and then to Cape Town, South Africa, after stopping in Paris for a while.

An old hand at hiking, Rosen walked almost the entire distance from Arizona to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, with a friend in 1963. They went by canoe down the Amazon and spent seven days hiking over the Andes Mountains.

Once, he crossed Europe, camping all the way.

Catholic Clergy, Laity, To Meet

Bishops, priests, and laymen from Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island will assemble in Charlottetown, August 9 to 12, to attend a Liturgical Institute, sponsored by the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Charlottetown, Yarmouth, and Antigonish.

The aim of the Institute is to give priests and laity a deeper appreciation of what is involved in the liturgical changes brought about by Vatican Council II, and has as its theme "Mind and Heart in Worship."

To help achieve this aim, a number of internationally-known speakers have been engaged to deliver keynote speeches, and special-interest sessions have been arranged for the four-day study period, which will be held at Basilea Recreation Center here.

Special sessions will be held for clergy, sisters, and lay people. Special workshops will be conducted in the following fields: art and architecture, music, catechesis, and family liturgy.

Keynote speaker for the Institute is Rev. Clifford Howell, S.J., noted Jesuit author and lecturer, from Birmingham-England. Father Howell will deliver three addresses at the Institute, and will head up a special session for the clergy.

Other speakers include Allen Frick, a prominent American architect, who will discuss changes in religious art and church architecture which are demanded by the new liturgy; Rev. Stephen Somerville, of St. Michael's Choir School, Toronto, on liturgical music and a workshop on the same subject.

The session on catechesis will be handled by Mother Chabanel, Toronto, assisted by Rev. F. Abbas, Antigonish, Rev. J.B. Wheaton, Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax, and Rev. Thomas MacLellan, S.D.U., Charlottetown. The family liturgy workshop will be headed by J.E. Green, Charlottetown, and Rev. Angus MacLeod, Family Life Bureau, Sydney, S.S.

House Building Scene Bright Despite Tight Money Problem

The effects of tight money appears to be slowing down a key segment of Canada's giant construction industry—housing starts.

Despite this however, the long-run outlook is bright says the head of Central Housing and Mortgage Corp.

H. W. Hignett, president of the town-owned housing agency, estimates 14,000 housing units will be built this year, a drop of 15 per cent from 1965.

His long-term optimism was based on the expected growth of Canada's population to 22,000,000 by the end of 1970 from about 20,000,000 now. Additionally, he said the swing to urban people to set up their own homes and a proportionately larger number of young families would boost housing demands and starts.

The chief problem for home builders is a lack of mortgage money, and Mr. Hignett said higher interest rates alone would not draw all the money needed into housing.

He added it would be unwise and undesirable in a period of prolonged and pronounced economic expansion to put enormous amounts of public funds into house-building operations. GET FEWER CONTRACTS

Southern Building Guide showed last week that Canadian construction contracts in the first half of this year fell 3.9 per cent from last year. Residential awards fell 12.7 per cent.

The six-month total of all awards was \$2,385,037,200, down from the record \$2,483,642,700 in the first six months of 1965.

Residential awards in the same period fell to \$597,189,700 from \$683,905,500.

Meanwhile, prices for homes in the Metropolitan Toronto area continue to skyrocket, the Toronto Real Estate Board reports.

Members of the board sold two fewer properties through multiple listing service in June than in the same month last year, but the prices brought in \$5,400,000 more.

Average price in June 1966 was \$21,368 compared with \$18,331 last June and \$15,831 two years ago.

Elsewhere on the business scene, Consolidated Paper Corp. Ltd. and Bathurst Paper Ltd. said they are studying the feasibility of a merger, thereby confirming rumors that have been rampant in financial circles for weeks.
