Trial By Judge, Jury Elected By Charlottetown Resident

John Henry Reid of Charlottetown elected trial by judge and jury when he appeared in City Police Court yesterday morning charged with possession of stolen goods knowing them to be stolen. He was remanded without bail until this morning after four Crown witnesses were heard in the preliminary hearing. Reid is specifically charged with possessing an eight m.m. movie camera and accessories valued at over \$50 knowing them to have been obtained through an indictable offence of theft.

William C. Matthews of Woodlawn Avenue told the court he obtained the camera and accessories from Eric Jay and took it to Taylor's Jewellery to check its condition. When he learned the camera had been reported stolen he returned it to Jay and told him he wished to have nothing to do with the camera and anything belonging to it. The fourth witness Eric Jay of Charlottetown said he bought the camera from the accused man for \$70 and asked Matthews to have it appraised for him. Upon learning it was stolen property he said he informed the city police. Police told him to return the camera and accessories to Reid which he did and told the accused that the property was stolen. He testified that Reid gave him his money back and accepted the return of the camera. Allison Gillis is defence counsel and John P. Nicholson is Crown Prosecutor.

Crackdown Is Likely On Intoxicated Driving

Noting that 11 persons have appeared in City Police Court in the last 14 days on charges of driving while intoxicated, Magistrate K. M. Martin warned yesterday that tougher measures will have to be introduced in dealing with such cases. "The present system... doesn't seem to be working out," said the city magistrate and if appearances on this charge are maintained at the present frequency, he will require more proof be presented before a guilty plea to the lesser charge of driving while impaired is accepted by the court. In order to acquire such proof, he felt it might be better if an adjournment of one or two days would be given. Two persons, one from the city and another from New Glasgow appeared on the charge of driving while intoxicated at yesterday's court sitting. The plea of guilty by the New Glasgow resident to the reduced charge of driving while impaired

was accepted and the man was fined \$150 and costs or 30 days. The city man had his case adjourned until May 21 at the request of the prosecution. In other cases on the docket a city man charged with attempted theft of an automobile had his case further adjourned until this morning. Convicted on a charge of disorderly conduct a city man drew a fine of \$10 and costs or five days. A resident of Cornwall charged with failing to stop at a red traffic light and a Waterville man charged with operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment were each fined \$5 and costs or two days. Two Hunter River residents appearing on charges of being drunk and incapable were each fined \$20 and costs or five days. A city resident appearing on a similar charge was fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Group Hears Bridge Report

An account of the problems met and conquered to date in the construction of the Hillsboro Bridge was given by Alec Scott, resident engineer for O. J. MacCulloch and Company, design engineers for the bridge, at the regular monthly meeting of the Association of Professional Engineers of Prince Edward Island and the Charlottetown branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada. Also speaking at the meeting, held at the Charlottetown Hotel Wednesday evening, was Harvey Lilley, superintendent of construction for Foundation Maritimes on this project. Mr. Scott also gave an insight into some of the problems that will arise in the next stage of construction, such as the placing and concreting of the piers and abutments. The presence of 13 young student engineers from St. Dunstan's University and several from the University of New Brunswick contributed greatly to the success of the meeting and gave these young men a chance to gain considerable knowledge from the experience of this engineer.

Mr. Orr, a native of Halifax but now a resident of Charlottetown, said the school was conducted for the benefit and education of supervisors and managers of Clover Farms across Canada and the United States. He thought the exchange of ideas and discussions of problems by the groups proved especially beneficial. "Mr. Diefenbaker will have to do much better than this if he is going to stem the tide of Canadian public opinion... against him in this matter of a square deal for Newfoundland." Mr. Fulton said in his speech that while Ottawa will always try to understand Newfoundland's point of view "I am far from certain that there has been an attempt to understand and give due credit to the point of view and the problems of the national government in this field." An error in Mr. Fulton's speech brought the comment from Premier Smallwood that much of the money sent to Newfoundland by Ottawa "must have been lost in the mails." Mr. Fulton told the board of trade that "the direct federal contribution to provincial government revenues have increased since we took office from \$55,341,000 to \$100,248,000." In a statement issued almost simultaneously with Mr. Smallwood's, the justice minister said he had erred. EXPLAINS ERROR "The correct figures should have shown an increase from \$24,411,000 to \$55,425,000," he

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House Leader Sees Possibility Of Trade

Definite openings exist for expanded trade between P.E.I. and Bermuda, R. R. Bell, Q.C., leader of the Opposition in the Island Legislature said yesterday. Mr. Bell and his wife returned recently from that island tourist haven where they enjoyed a two-week vacation. From inquiries he made during his vacation, Mr. Bell feels trade possibilities exist in the fields of dairy heifers, hay, potatoes, building products, canned products, including evaporated milk and powdered milk. In talking with Bermuda trade officials, and the Canadian trade commissioner Harold Butterfield, president of the Butterfield Bank, as well as importer Rodeo Bermuda "is interested in what the Maritime Provinces have to sell. Bermuda at present imports hay from Quebec at \$30 per ton; potatoes which retail at \$6 per 75-pound bag from Maine and young heifers imported from the Guelph area of Ontario cost about \$400 each. With a small dairy cattle is 36 cents per quart and there

is a great demand for processed milk products. "It would seem to me," Mr. Bell said, "that this market is well worth investigating and I would strongly recommend that our local trade officials investigate this matter fully." Touching on the tourist trade Mr. Bell felt that although Bermuda's accommodation facilities were superior to those of P.E.I. the island had better beaches and bathing facilities.
