### Three Island Students Selected For Festival

Three island high school students have been chosen to represent the St. Francis Xavier Regional High School at the 1963-64 Scholastic Competition, to be held at the University of New Brunswick from July 21 to Aug. 3, as guests of the Canada Council.

Chosen were Brian Wonnacott, grade 12 student at Prince of Wales College, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Wonnacott, Charlottetown; Lynn Murphy, grade 11 student at Kensington Regional High School, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alan Murphy, Charlottetown; and Ann Peters, grade 12 student at Stella Maris Regional High School, North Rustico, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alban Peters, Mayfield.

The students, chosen on the basis of their scholastic ability and interest in drama and music, were selected by a committee made up of Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister of education; Fred Large, president of the P.E.I. Music Festival Association; and Tom Lofhan, representing the principal of Prince of Wales College.

During the four days of the festival, the students will see performances of The Tempest, The Taming of the Shrew, The Goodwives, Macbeth, and Cyrano de Bergerac.

The students, who will be chaperoned, will travel by "Canada Council train" to Stratford, Ontario.

ALBERTON — The addition of an auditorium to Alberton Regional High School was discussed Tuesday night at the annual school meeting and a five-member committee was appointed to obtain facts and figures on the proposal.

John Rochford, chairman of the board of trustees, noted that Alberton district regional high was the only one in the province without a suitable auditorium. Members of the committee are Andrew Wells, Robert Campbell, John Rochford, Gerald Hardy and Jack Clark.

In his annual report, Mr. Rochford noted that 23 trustee meetings were held, a commercial course established, classes started for retarded children as well as night classes and a ballet class taught by Mrs. Andrew Wells.

In addition, an agricultural short course was held in the school, and meetings of the farmers' co-operative union were being held.

In regard to sports he noted that the school team had captured the West Prince hockey title and softball was now being played.

An intercommunication system has been ordered, chairs have been obtained for the assembly hall and dresses for the class rooms. Grade 12 students were transported to a career counselling course in Summerside, his report stated.

In a brief report school supervisor, Merritt Callaghan said he found the school in excellent condition and he commended the teaching body for splendid work.

A total of \$38,000 was voted in the budget for the coming year.
