# Blood Clinics Set For Borden Mon.

Plans for the Red Cross blood donor clinic to be held in Borden next Monday, Dec. 2, were finalized at a recent meeting held at the Legion Home there and attended by the provincial blood donor chairman, P. A. S. Jones of Charlottetown.

Representatives of the Borden Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, the Charlottetown Women's Institute and the Albany Lions Club, who are the joint sponsors of this clinic, were on hand to discuss the details with J. J. MacIsaac of Borden, who is eligible again the over-all chairman.

Clinic hours for Borden have been arranged for Monday afternoon, Dec. 2, between 2 and 4, and in the evening between 7 and 9 in order that as many as possible of the CNR employees on shift work will have the opportunity of attending.

With the addition of the extra hours during which the clinic will be open, the Borden committee has an objective of 210 donors to meet. According to the chairman, Jack MacIsaac, this high quota imposes a great responsibility on the sponsoring groups, as well as on all those who are eligible as prospective donors—that is, those in good health and between the ages of 18 and 65 years of age.

Mr. MacIsaac has high hopes that residents in the Borden area will rise to the occasion and show their appreciation of the Red Cross blood transfusion service—a vital life-saver—by exceeding the 210 objective.

The Borden area won the coveted "Manning Trophy" two years ago, and will make an all-out effort to achieve it again this year.

To date, Souris is ahead in this provincial competition having achieved a 130 per cent increase in the number of donors during the past summer.

# Kensington Trade Bd. Says Act Lacks Teeth

KENSINGTON — George MacMurdo, president of the Kensington Area Board of Trade, said in a speech made here in Wednesday, Nov. 27 evening at the old town hall.

The president gave a report on a special meeting on community planning, which was addressed by Claude Smith, provincial director of community planning.

A Town Planning Act was enacted in 1959 which covers suburban Charlottetown, all incorporated villages, all that area within 300 feet of the Trans-Canada Highway, the area within one mile of the boundaries of all our towns and villages, and also several school districts.

The act only covers school districts, and has named a committee, and have made application to have building regulations apply to the school district. The aim of the Kensington Board of Trade in calling the special meeting, was to interest surrounding school districts in taking advantage of the act.

However, Mr. MacMurdo stated that the response was poor, and rural school districts were not represented at the meeting.

During the discussion which followed, a member related results of conversations held with secretaries of two school districts. Both indicated that after meetings and discussions with secretaries of their districts, it was decided that no action will be taken at the present time to form a planning committee.

It was agreed by the meeting that the Town Planning Act is "in it" as instances were disclosed in which no action was taken in spite of complaints by organized committees. The suggestion was made that a bill be referred to the next council meeting.

# Eugene J. Wynne Dies In Ch'town

Eugene J. Wynne, 60 Green Street, Charlottetown, retired post office department employee and former commissioner, died suddenly at his home yesterday.

Mr. Wynne had been a druggist for many years in Charlottetown before he entered the civil service in the post office. He served overseas during the First World War with the 8th Siege Battery.

Before his retirement five years ago he was a member of the Canadian Corps of Commissioners. He was also a member for many years of the old League of the Cross Band.

He will be resting this evening at the Hennessey Funeral Home and the funeral will be held Monday morning to the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer for Requiem High Mass at 9:15.

He is survived by his wife and son, Eugene, in Charlottetown; son Gerard in Montreal, and a daughter Patricia (Mrs. Cyril MacInach) in Niagara Falls. He is also survived by a sister, Mr. Edward Teas.

# Top Killer Legislation Is Opposed

A recent suggestion by Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae, that legislation be introduced at the next session of the legislature banning the use of poisonous potato killers, was turned down by farmers meeting Thursday night in Summerside.

A resolution backing the idea of banning the toxic sprays, which are used mainly for killing potato pests, and have resulted in 75 or more cattle deaths this year, was rejected by the farmers, who attended the meetings of the Prince County federation of agriculture.

The non-poisonous sprays were attacked on the grounds that they are much more costly; several said they are unsatisfactory, and two large potato growers termed them "useless."

A recent announcement by Mr. MacRae indicated he will seek legislation to ban poisonous top killers because of the toll they take of live stock in the province. The poisonous effect on streams was also noted.

# Tignish Men Are Fined For Fishing Oysters

Three Tignish men were each found guilty of unlawfully fishing oysters in the Bay of Fundy when they appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens county magistrate's court yesterday.

The men, Jerry Joseph Gaudet, Kevin Fiddle DeRoches and Paul Joseph Boudreau, each charged under the fisheries act and were fined \$20 and costs or 10 days. They were fishing near Brackley Beach.

Austin Lewis Mallette, St. John's, was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days for failing to appear in court after being issued a summons, a warrant was issued for Leo Aidan Smith, Bedford, charged with assaulting Emmett Joseph Smith, also of Bedford.

James Robert Mutch, St. Herbert, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days for driving a vehicle across an intersection when it was unsafe to do so.

Bremont Gerald Campbell, New Brunswick, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to drive on the right hand side of the road while operating a car-truck collision on the paved road leading to Cape Traverse.

William Hill of Charlottetown was admitted to hospital yesterday after a car, in which he was a passenger, and driven by Mrs. Wallace Muttart, also of Charlottetown, was in collision with a half-ton truck driven by Edward MacLellan, from the same community. The accident occurred about 5 p.m.

Mr. MacLellan was alone in the truck, but Mrs. Muttart was in addition to Mr. Hill, accompanied in the car by her daughter, Connie, and Mrs. William Hill.

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# Quarterly MPBT Meeting Slated For Moncton, Dec. 2

The quarterly meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade executive council and the Maritime regional committee of the Maritime Board of Commerce will be held Monday, Dec. 2 in Moncton, N.B.

Co-chairmen for the joint meeting will be Charles R. Hunter of Charlottetown, president of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, and F.H. Kerwin, Halifax, N.S., chairman of the regional committee.

Other island delegates will be Cyril Leard of Alberton, Max Thompson of Victoria, William J. Hancox of Charlottetown and Claude Leves, executive member, Canadian Chamber of Commerce and Jack Wright, president of AFPEC both of Summerside.

The agenda will include a report on the Canadian Chamber of Commerce annual meeting held in Quebec, highlights of the chamber brief to the royal commission on taxation, and old age pension.

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There will be a presentation and review of the new MPBT policy declaration booklet which has been published; a report on the MPBT annual meeting to be held in Charlottetown, May 24-26, 1964, and membership and financial reports.

Discussions will take place on the proposals for subjects for the Canadian Chamber of Commerce program for 1964 which were presented by Victor Oland, Halifax, at the annual Canadian Chamber of Commerce meeting. Mr. Oland was then national president.

On the agenda will be arrangements for meetings with the provincial governments to present the board's policy and resolutions as approved at this year's annual meeting; and reports from the Maritime Trade Commission's commission and AFPEC.

The day's program starts at 9:30. The president will be Victor Oland, past president of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and W.A. Sherman, Montreal, assistant general manager of the national organization.

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
