RENOWNED R. C. C. S. BAND HERE FOR WEEKEND

The Royal Canadian Corps of
Signals Band, renowned for their
musicianship, will add to the
Charlottetown's Centennial festi-
vities this weekend. They will take
part in the Garrison Church Par-
ade Sunday morning and later
that evening give a concert at the
Memorial Field commencing at
8:30.

The Band will also participate
in the Float Parade on Monday
and on Monday evening will again
be heard in conjunction with the
presentation of the Centennial His-
toric Pageant at the Exhibition
Coliseum.

Less than a year after making
its first public appearance, which
took place in Kingston on Monday
the Royal Canadian Corps of
Signals Band was described by the
official Kingston Whig-Standard
as having "grown into Canada's
best military band".

The colourful band, which is
based at Vimy Barracks on the
outskirts of Kingston, made its
debut at a local Community Chest
Campaign in September, 1952, and
has since attained such distinction
and popularity that it took part
in Ottawa's coronation ceremonies
the following June, and the Corona-
tion Ball. It also played a promi-
nent part in the 50th anniver-
sary celebration of the formation
of the Royal Canadian Corps of
Signals at Kingston last October.

The first handsman was recruit-
ed on January 22, 1952, and in
less than a year he had been joined
by a group of military, classical
and dance musicians forming a
musical organization second to
none, equally at home on the par-
ade square or in the concert hall.
LEADING MUSICIANS

The picturesque scarlet-clad
band is made up of Canadians,
top artists from Holland's sym-
phonic and radio orchestras, and
high-calibre musicians from some
of England's top military bands.
The band spent part of a recent
summer at the United States Sig-
nals Centre at Fort Monmouth,
N.J., where they filled a complete
schedule of engagements, including
an appearance on a national tele-

vision network from New York.
It was the first time a Canadian
military band appeared on a na-
tional TV hook-up in the U. S. A.
Behind this rise to fame is the
band's Director of Music, 47-year-
old Capt. Bernard J. Lyons, who
has organized more hands than
any other director in the Canadian
Army.

A veteran of 23 years' service
with the Canadian Army as a
soldier-musician, he is unlike most
conductors of military bands in
asmuch as he might be termed
unpredictable—a trait his music-
ianly life he will switch from a con-
certo by Tschakowsky to a bogie-
woogie number that never fails to
catch his audience by surprise.

After attending England's famed
Kneller Hall, the goal of all mili-
tary handsman in the Common-
wealth, for four years, Capt. Lyons
was appointed to the newly author-
ized Royal Canadian Corps of Sig-
nals Band, which in England has
been a member of the Royal Air
Force Band, and he also
played string bass and tuba with
the BBC symphony orchestra.
Royal Covent Garden Opera or-
chestra and the Sadlers Wells Bal-
let orchestra.

When asked to form a Signals
band for the Canadian Army, he
started training Ontario night
clubs, churches, small orchestras
and cadet corps bands looking for
musicians. Practice was started in
April 1952 with six men, and three
months later, with nine men, the
band played its first mess dinner.
Capt. Lyons believes that the
smallest military band ever to
play for such an occasion.

FIRST BIG BREAK came when the
band was recruited to accompany
Field Marshal Viscount
Montgomery on his tour of
Canada and the United States in
the Spring of 1953.

Then the band was asked to
play at Ottawa's Coronation cere-
monies, the Coronation ball, state
ball and the Governor General's
