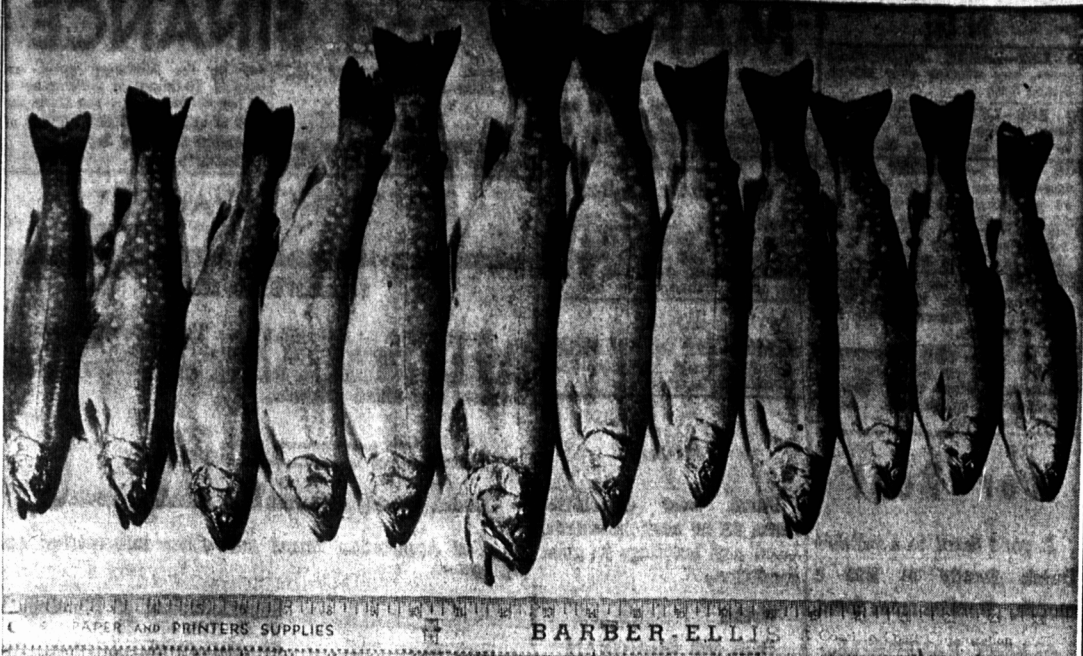

OTTAWA (CP) — Total profits of Canadian corporations, before taxes, dropped by \$156,000,000 in 1954 to \$2,414,000,000, the lowest since 1947, according to a report of statistics estimated. Thursday's figures are preliminary. Profits remaining after deducting taxes declined by \$92,000,000 to \$1,262,000,000, down seven per cent from 1953.
